

### Sunday School Notes

**SIDEGLIGHTS ON NEXT SUNDAY'S Lesson for Teachers and Pupils Edited by CHARLES K. MEYERS**

Jan. 11. Peter and John Heal a Lame Man, Acts 3, 1-16.

Our study this week follows close to our last lesson. It will be remembered that last week we talked about the day of Pentecost, and the great address made by Peter which moved multitudes of people to believe on Jesus Christ.

Those were stirring times, and one is not surprised that events of great consequence follow. First after each other. Although Peter and John were proclaiming a new gospel which in time meant the overthrow of the old Jewish church, yet these disciples still felt that Jesus came firstly to the Jews, and they could not and would not give up veneration for the great temple at Jerusalem, and were ready to take part in the ceremonies, which customarily took place there. This being so, we are not surprised to learn that about the "hour of prayer" Peter and John went their way to the temple.

It will be no news to those informed as to the customs of the east, that sick, deformed, unfortunate people expected to support themselves by begging. The two disciples encountered a man who was lame from his birth and who was placed daily by his friends at the door of the temple, that he might beg of the worshippers. The hearts of Peter and John were moved with pity for this man and they determined to cure him. Peter spoke to the man to draw his attention, and this he succeeded in doing, for the man was eager for notice, as with it usually went a gift of money. The poor fellow was about to receive something of far more value to him than dollars and cents. He was undoubtedly surprised when one of the strangers reached down and took him by the hand, raising him up, and at the same time saying, "Silver and gold have I none; but what I have I give thee, in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, walk." The man was inspired by faith to try to rise and to believe that his cure could be accomplished. He was wild with joy when his ankle bones received strength, and he was able to walk and leap. He knew that a miracle had been performed upon him and praised God for what had been done.

Of course the healing of the lame man made a great commotion and the bystanders crowded about Peter and John as if they were wonderful people. As

soon as the crowd assembled Peter made denial that he had any power in himself to heal the lame man, but held up Jesus as the power which had done the great miracle. He promptly reminded his listeners that the Jesus he was talking about was the person whom many of his hearers had helped put to death.

The lesson for this week is timely. The leaders of the churches are about to launch a great evangelistic movement. It is acknowledged on all sides that the need is great. No pastor but calls forth "Proclaim the name of Jesus as the Saviour and helper of mankind." In this they are but following the steps of Peter and John in the early days of the Christian religion. Many readers have noted as to the great meeting of college students which has been held in Des Moines recently. The address of the renowned John R. Mott was given nearly in full. It was most stirring. Here are a few sentiments from his remarkable talk:

We have come here to get a commanding vision of the new world. Old things are literally passing away that all things may become new.

What is the call of God to the colleges and university of today? It is leadership.

A spirit of courageous faith should dominate us all—faith in God, that He is, that He lives, that the things which are impossible with men are possible with Him.

We are rising up together into the mountain peak of a deep and inspiring Christian experience—a mountain on which we see no man save Jesus only.

Peter was holding up Jesus only in his talk after the healing of the lame man. It is the way the world will be saved at this critical time. Many of us like Peter have silver and gold to pour forth in profusion for the spread of the gospel, but every Christian can hold up Jesus as their personal savior and advise friends and neighbors to accept Him. It is a powerful sermon from my pastor this afternoon based on the dignity of God to Moses as to what he held in his hand at the time when the great law given, hesitated about taking the leadership of his people. This drift of the sermon was to urge all to make use of the things now in possession,

and with their use God would give great success. There is plan to have a great revival take place in the country and indeed the world round. I make use of the drill sentence, "Now is the time for all good men to come to the help of their country," and say "Now is the time for all good Christians to come to the help of the religion of Jesus," and this may be the great message of the column this week.
