Languages of Belgium.

Belgium has two chief languages: Flemish in East Flanders and West Flanders, Antwerp, Limburg and Brant provinces, or the north and east; French in the province of Liege, Namur and Hainaut and in Luxembourg. The French-speaking Belgians claim to descend from the Belgae, being called Walloons. In 1910, of the 7,423,784 people of Belgium, 3,220,662 spoke only Flemish, 2,833,384 spoke only French, 871,278 spoke both Flemish and French, 31,415 spoke German, 74,983 spoke French and German, 8,052 spoke Flemish and German, 52,547 spoke all three languages.
