SAY CATTLE AND HOG PRICES WILL BE HIGH

The packers of the country are optimistic over the immediate outlook for good prices for hogs and cattle, and expect to quote the packers at least the following is the way they have conditions sized up.

Nothing could send prices of cattle and hogs downward so quickly and so surely as an upset to the business world which would bring about unemployment of labor, the statement continues.

The next factor of importance is the foreign situation. There are two angles to this. First, Europe's present day buying, second, the overhauling possibility not only of much heavier buying in the future, but of developments that may check the present buying movement.

At this time England is buying considerable in the way of hogs and cattle on the east plus basis. For three months past this has been the policy of the British food ministry, which is handling England's food situation.

Conditions being as they are, it is clear why Europe is confining its purchases to the barest necessities. There is hardly a doubt that a large loan to Europe on the part of the United States would do more to bring up livestock prices than any other factor.

Having recently purchased a herd of eighty head of Holsteins in Montana, the Iowa state board of health is handling the creature in a special dairy.
