VOTING MACHINES

At an expense of \$26,642.00 every voting precinct in Crawford county will be provided with a voting machine and voters of the county will in the future use a machine to cast their vote instead of making the ballot which has been the custom for years. The board of supervisors at a meeting held last week purchased twenty-eight of these voting machines from the Automatic Machine Corporation, of Jamestown, N. Y., at the stipulated price of \$951.50 each f. o. b. the factory so that by time they are delivered to each voting place they will cost in the neighborhood of \$1,000. For several weeks there has been a representative of the company in Denison with samples of the machine and of late this machine has been exhibited in several towns of the county. Just how popular the voting machine will prove to be with the voters of Crawford county remains to be seen. The machine is simple enough for one who takes the time to study its operation and the use of it is certainly an improvement over the ballot system when it comes to counting the votes. With the machine it will be possible to secure the entire vote of the county within two or three hours after the polls are closed. It will necessarily mean long waits at some of the precincts for with the machine only one person can vote at a time where heretofore several booths have been provided. The change of course means much to the election clerks and judges who will have practically nothing to do until the polls close when they will open up the machine and record the vote for the various candidates. Politicians who delight in setting up and waiting for the various returns election night will find little excuse for remaining away from their families after ten o'clock for by that time the entire vote of the county should be in.
