QUITS BANK AFTER 30 YEARS

E. W. Pierce Resigns Position With First National Bank After Thirty Years of Service

CONTINUES TO RESIDE HERE

After Methodist Conference in May Mr. Pierce Will Take Much Needed Rest. Has Dakota Interests

After rounding out thirty years of service with the First National bank of Denison, Mr. E. W. Pierce resigned his position as assistant cashier of that institution on Monday of this week, and thus retires from active business life. The announcement will come as a surprise to the large circle of friends of Mr. Pierce in Crawford county. It will be most welcome news to everyone to know that Mr. and Mrs. Pierce will continue to make their home in Denison.

Mr. Pierce has not been in the best of health for the past two years and in the summer of 1918 was threatened with a nervous breakdown from which he did not recover as speedily as he desired, and feeling that perhaps this was due to the fact that the position he occupied confined him too closely indoors, decided to tender his resignation. To the McHenry it was almost like having one of the family withdrawn from the business and it was suggested that by an adjustment of work he could remain at his post with less attention to detail and continue his valued service to the institution for at least another year.

At the annual session of the Des Moines conference last summer he was elected as one of the six delegates to the General conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, and in order that he might give the position the attention it deserves, he requested his resignation be accepted to take effect January 1, 1920. But when the year arrived he was prevailed to reconsider and stay on until the March 1st rush slackened.

It fell to the lot of Denison to play the first game of the tournament being pitted against Nevada, and were defeated by the close score of 19 to 17. The game was called for eight o'clock Thursday morning and the players had to turn out at six o'clock and after a hasty breakfast got to the gymnasium where the tournament was held. The fact that the game was played on a regulation sized floor made it difficult for the Denison players who have been more used to playing on a smaller floor.

In the second half the Denison quintette went up in the air and did not exhibit any team work. NELSON BUSINESS BLOCK IS SOLD

L. T. Petersen Purchases Ed. Nelson's Business Block at Court and Center Street. Consideration \$20,000

NELSON REMAINS IN BUSINESS

Intends to Either Buy or Build Building More Suitable to His Business

A deal was consummated yesterday whereby Mr. L. T. Petersen became the owner of the Ed. Nelson business block located on the corner of Center and Court streets. We understand the purchase price was \$20,000.

For several months Mr. Petersen has been looking for permanent quarters for his business and as the Nelson building seemed to be suitable in every respect he negotiated for it and the deal was closed. Mr. Petersen came to Denison last year and purchased the tin and furnace department from Fisher & Gray and moved into the frame building on Main street which was formerly occupied by the Herald. Mr. Petersen is an expert on hot air heating and has been doing an exceptionally good business since locating here. Mr. Nelson informs us that he will continue in the harness business in Denison and that he will either build or buy another business property. He does not have to give possession of the present building until March 1921 unless he is able to secure other suitable quarters before that time. His building was not well adapted for the harness business and for this reason was disposed to sell it. For the past two or three years he has catered to the repairing of automobile tops and it is his desire to have a building where cars can drive in to have this kind of work done.

The Nelson building is one of the best properties in the city being centrally located. The building was built in 1914 and only the best of material went into it. It has a frontage of 20 feet on Court street and runs back 60 feet, the full depth of the lot, and has two stories with basement. Mr. Nelson occupied the ground floor with his harness and shoe store and the second floor is made up of business offices. The building is heated with steam.
