### DEATH VISITED UPON E. K. BURCH

Well Known Denison Attorney Succumbs to Dread Disease Pneumonia This Wednesday Morning

### HAD BEEN ILL BUT A FEW DAYS

From the Start Disease Progressed Rapidly—Medical Skill and Careful Nursing Could Not Help

The community generally was startled this morning to hear of the death of our townsman, E. K. Burch. His friends knew and there may have been something of a general knowledge of his being ill. It was but a few days ago that he was on the street apparently enjoying the best of health. It was but rapidly until a day or two ago it was confined to his home on account of an attack of pleurisy, which speedily developed into an attack of pneumonia. From the start his disease progressed rapidly until a day or two ago it was said that he perhaps might not be able to pass the crisis which was expected today.

On yesterday afternoon it was predicted that he would probably not be able to keep up the fight until the crisis was passed and this morning at about 8 o'clock he passed away. Mr. Burch was a well known character in this locality. He had lived here a great many years, where he had been engaged in the practice of law. He was married here to Miss Maria Kuhn and practically all of their married life they resided in this community. They had two daughters, Mary, the eldest, being now the wife of Albert Stojtenberg, a successful merchant at Schleswig; Helen, another daughter, lives in Denison and for a number of years since her mother's death has been a constant companion of her father, and in charge of the home where they resided. Mr. Burch for a number of years has had charge of the drainage ditch business in the county and was regarded as an expert on the law governing this character of work. He had a bright and lively manner and a large number of friends who have found in him a genial companion and a pleasant gentleman to meet under all circumstances. He was a man of good education, a great reader and possessed of a large fund of information and well posted on current events as well as matters of historical interest. He took an unusual interest in politics and of late years was allied with the democratic party although not always endorsing the policy and the candidates of the party.

Mr. Burch will be greatly missed in the community and especially by those who were in the habit of meeting him daily and visiting with him. The community naturally feels a deep interest in his children, both of whom are well and favorably known in Denison. The funeral will be held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the home, Rev. M. M. Cable officiating.

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### DISTRICT COURT Judge Hutchison Presiding Over District Court Now in Session—Fitzsimmons Foreman Grand Jury

District court in session this week with Judge Hutchison presiding. He missed train connections Monday and did not arrive until too late in the evening to open court and court therefore did not convene until Tuesday morning. Everything is moving forward with proper dispatch. The grand jury was empaneled yesterday forenoon after the docket had been called and cases assigned for trial. Foreman of the grand jury is Fred Fitzsimmons, of Hayes, and the other jurors are H. C. Kohn, of Denison; A. L. Nelson, of Boyer; T. A. Rae, of Union; J. E. Malloy, of West Side; Fred Blevens, of Willow; R. H. Grimes, of Nishnabony township. The work of the grand jury will require but little of its time and the probabilities are that but two or three days will be consumed by that body in the discharge of the work of this session. This fact proves that there is little violation of the criminal laws in this county.

Assignment of civil cases embraces equity cases for this week and law cases for the remaining two weeks of the term. The first case assigned for trial this week is that of Jacobus vs. Grill, being an equity case and embraces a partnership transaction between the parties relating to bridge building in the county. The case of Geo. V. Jordan vs. D. B. Marks is also on trial this week, as well as the Ben Smith vs. Nels V. Sorenson and others. Chances are that the court will be able to dispose of the equity cases before the end of the week. There are a large number of law cases assigned for trial beginning next week and the court will probably not be able to dispose of all the cases within the time allowed for their trial.
