## COUNCIL MET MONDAY EVENING

Mayor and Marshal's Official Bonds Are Approved at Monday Evening Meeting. Appropriation Ordinance Passed

### MANY PETITIONS PRESENTED

Announcement of Various Committees Not Made by the Mayor. Solicitor and Permanent Clerk Not Appointed

The city council met in an adjourned session last Monday evening, at which time the mayor's bond was approved, as was the bond of the marshal, Ed M. Plahive. There were a number of petitions before the council asking for grades, water, and fire protection. Citizens living on North Jefferson avenue between Church street and East Prospect street asked to have the street put to grade in order that they might build permanent sidewalks. Property owners living on West Fremont street between Wall and Court streets, asked that a sidewalk grade be given in order that the county might build a new sidewalk on the north of the court house square. The Commercial Club presented a resolution asking that action be taken at once tending to place the road leading from the Illinois Central station west to the Leffelt corner in a good condition, saying that the business interests of the city depended on the condition of this road. Elmer Hill made a proposition to the city to work by the year, furnishing himself and team the year round for \$500 per month. No action was taken in the matter at the present time. An appropriation ordinance was passed and will be found on another page of this issue.

The mayor has not as yet made his appointments of the various committees to be made up of the council, but expects to have the list ready in the near future. However, Councilman Clark White is acting as chairman of the street and alley committee and Councilman H. L. Fitch is acting as chairman of the electric light committee. Mr. Binkley was asked to the council that Deloit was anxious to purchase electricity from Denison and that at an election held in Deloit April 3d, the proposition of bonding the town for ten thousand dollars with which to build a line had carried. The matter was referred to the council to consider out of session and report as soon as possible. The council has not appointed a solicitor as yet, neither have they decided upon a permanent clerk, and these two appointments will no doubt come before a meeting soon to be held.

## ANNUAL MEETING HELD MONDAY

Stockholders of Oakland Cemetery Association Met at Club Rooms Monday Evening—No Quorum Present

The regular annual meeting of the Oakland Cemetery association was scheduled to be held at the Carnegie club rooms on last Monday evening at 8 o'clock, but as a quorum was not present the meeting was adjourned without transacting any business. Only four stockholders were in attendance. It is to be regretted that the stockholders in the cemetery association are not taking an active interest in the affairs of the cemetery. For the past three years the annual meeting has failed to attract enough of the stockholders to permit their transacting any business.

The Oakland cemetery is one of the prettiest cemeteries in this section of the state and the improvements made during the past few years have been due to the efforts of but a few of the members who show a disposition to keep the property improved.

### MRS. PEARL BURRELL DEAD

Passes Away Sunday at Her Home on the Life Biggs Farm in Goodrich Township

Mrs. Nellie Pearl Burrell passed away on Sunday, April 11th, at the family residence on the Life Biggs farm northwest of Denison, the immediate cause of her death being due to heart trouble, at the age of 36 years, 10 months and 9 days. Her death occurred at 4:30 in the forenoon.

She leaves to mourn her untimely death her husband and two children and her parents, who reside at Emmetsburg.

Mrs. Burrell has been a resident of this community four years, her husband coming here to take a position with the Nicholson Produce company, and only a short time ago they moved to the Biggs farm. Mrs. Burrell made many friends in the community during her residence here. She was a devoted wife and a kind and loving mother and her loss will be felt greatly.

Brief services were held at the home Tuesday evening and the remains were taken to Emmetsburg this morning, where funeral services will be held and interment made at the cemetery there.

## SMALL CROWD ATTENDS CONTEST

Iowa State High School Declamatory Contest Last Friday Falls to Draw Big Crowd—Good Entertainment

12 CONTESTANTS IN 3 CLASSES

Highest Number of Points Given to J. West Townsend, of Traver, in the Oratorical Class

The Iowa state high school declamatory contest, held at the opera house here on Friday evening, did not draw as large a crowd as had been expected, probably due to the fact that the local high school was not represented and the majority of the other schools represented being so far removed that it was difficult for them to send delegations here. Those of our people who attended feel well repaid for their efforts and pronounce it one of the best entertainments of its kind ever given here.

There were twelve contestants in the three classes, oratorical, dramatic and humorous, who were winners over 8,000 high school students of the state who competed in the various elimination contests. The winners of the three classes according to the decision of the judges were: J. West Townsend, of Traver, in the oratorical class, his subject being "Plea for Cuba"; Miss Marguerite Sexton, of Waterloo, in the dramatic class, her subject being "The Alien"; and Dean Caldwell, of Clarinda, in the humorous class, his subject being "The Debating Society."

It was no easy task for Superintendent Saam, of Council Bluffs; Superintendent Minkie, of Ft. Dodge, and Assistant Superintendent Smith, of Omaha, the judges, to pick the winners, but it is remarkable that all three of the judges did rank the same winners of each class the same, although their markings did differ on the remainder of the contestants.

Below we give the names of the contestants in each class in the order in which the judges placed them:

Oratorical—1st, J. West Townsend, Traver; 2d, Frank Charter, Guthrie Center; 3d, Earl Thompson, Lyons; 4th, Garritt Schutt, Sioux Center.

Dramatic—1st, Marguerite Sexton, West Waterloo; 2d, Edith Replote, Shenandoah; 3d, Dorothy Gnam, Carroll; 4th, Mildred Furniss, Newton.

Humorous—1st, Dean Caldwell, Clarinda; 2d, Milo Middleton, Beaman; 3d, Wanda Evans, New Sharon; 4th, Helen Desmond, Webster City.

In the dramatic class Miss Mildred Furniss was awarded third place in points by the judges, but as she exceeded the time limit in delivering her subject she was put in fourth place and Miss Gnam awarded third place.

The highest number of points was given to J. West Townsend, of Traver, in the oratorical class, the judges giving him 95; the next highest being Earl Thompson in the oratorical class and Dean Caldwell in the humorous class, each being given 91 points. The smallest number of points received by a contestant was 78.

Throughout the entertainment music was furnished by the high school orchestra and glee club. It was not until 11:30 that the contest closed.

## CADDOCK THROWS ZBYSKO

Iowa Wrestler Took Two Straight Falls From Polish Wrestler at Coliseum in Des Moines Monday Night

Earl Caddock defeated Wladek Zbyszko, the Pole, in two straight falls at the coliseum in Des Moines Monday night in one of the hardest mat contests ever put on in the capital city. It was Caddock's first appearance in Des Moines since returning from overseas and some 4500 wrestling fans were present.

For nearly two hours it was a great struggle in which hard wrestling and action played a prominent part. Caddock pinned the big Pole's shoulders to the mat for the first fall in 1 hour, 36 minutes and 10 seconds, and the second fall came after only 1 minute and 56 seconds, both the result of a head scissors and wristlock, the Iowan's favorite hold.

Wrestling fans have been watching with interest Caddock's efforts to "come back" and his ardent supporters are confident that he will be able to wrest the championship from Stecher.

## DOW CITY PASTOR CALLED

Rev. W. T. Rink, Pastor of Methodist Episcopal Church at Dow City, Passed Away Monday

DOW CITY, April 12—(Special to the Review)—A deep gloom was cast over the entire community this morning when it was learned that Rev. W. T. Rink, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church of this place, had passed away at 12 o'clock on Monday night. His illness has been of long duration and the news of his death did not come as a surprise to many of his friends who were aware of the serious nature of the ailment with which he has been suffering for some time.

In the death of Rev. Rink Dow City loses one of its foremost citizens, a man who held the respect and esteem of the entire community and one who always took an active interest in all movements for the betterment of the town.

Early last October he was given a months leave of absence and left for Pennsylvania for a visit with his people. Only a few days after his arrival there he was taken seriously ill and an immediate operation was advised for gall stones. His wife joined him a week later and the operation was performed. He, together with his wife and children, returned here Thursday evening of last week. Although he was in a critical condition it was his wish to return to Dow City.

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## MOTOR DRIVERS MORE CAREFUL

Every Effort Is Being Made by the New City Administration to Have Motor Law Obeyed

MANY ARE CITED TO APPEAR

Some Twenty Offenders Appear Before the Mayor on Monday Morning—No Action Against Them

Every effort is being made by the new city administration to enforce the state law and city ordinances in regard to the operation of motor vehicles within the corporate limits of Denison and there is a feeling of satisfaction on the part of residents of the city that action is being taken along this line. Already it is quite noticeable that there is a disposition on the part of drivers of motor vehicles to observe the law and speeding is not as common as it was a week ago. The garages report that they have been working overtime installing mufflers, tail lights, number brackets, etc.

The city marshal was busy Friday and Saturday taking note of drivers who were not complying with the law and some six or eight special officers were on duty Saturday night, with the result that some twenty offenders were summoned to appear in police court at the city hall Monday morning at 10 o'clock. The summons served stated that failure to appear would mean that a warrant for arrest would be issued.

The offenders who had been summoned were on hand at the appointed hour and Mayor Patterson presided. After calling the meeting, however, protest was made by one of the parties summoned that the city administration had no jurisdiction to direct him to appear before the mayor for the reason that the mayor and city marshal were not qualified to act in an official capacity, their bonds not having been approved by the city council as the law requires.

Police court then adjourned without any action being taken against those who had been summoned.

At the time of the recent state declamatory contest at Denison there was much interest developed over the contestant, Miss Sexton, from Waterloo, because she was the pupil of an ex-Denison girl, Miss Florence Baker. Miss Baker lived here for many years, her parents being well known. She went from Denison to study oratory and returned to teach it here for a time. Miss Baker has been with the Waterloo schools for over two years and has scored a distinct success in having her pupils carry off the state prize in the dramatic class. This called for an immense amount of work for them both. The selection was called "The Alien," and the dialect of a poor Italian and his daughter, Rosa. The selection was one never presented before but a cutting down of a much greater story and thus a creation for the occasion. Miss Baker was with her aunt, Mrs. Jennie Jones, while here.

Mrs. Chas. K. Meyers will be held at the Des Moines general hospital for some weeks yet as her case will need plenty of rest and good care.
