Committee From the Crawford County Breeders' Association and Arion Fair Board Hold Meeting

MISUNDERSTANDINGS CLEARED

Will Hold Another Meeting in the Near Future When Matter Will Finally Be Disposed of

Last Monday evening in the farm bureau office a committee from the Crawford County Breeders' association met with the Arion fair board to discuss the county fair plans of this and future years. The meeting held Monday evening was the result of an action taken at the breeders' banquet last April, when the breeders of the county appointed a committee of seven men to investigate and consider further the possibilities of a county fair in Crawford county that is in line with the resources of the county. The breeders appointed on the committee were: A. J. Barrow, of Manilla, as chairman; R. E. Brown, Dunlap; Z. T. Dunham, Dunlap; Chas. Speck, Denison; T. A. Harvey, Denison; James D. Fleming, Deloit, and S. A. Kral, of Vail. The committee immediately got in touch with the president, C. J. Welch, of the Commercial club, and asked if the Denison fair committee were yet interested in the fair movement. According to Mr. Welch, the Denison business men preferred to let the fair proposition stand for the present, since it was creating some unjust criticism against the Denison business men. Mr. Welch stated that Denison would welcome and support the fair, but that the city did not wish to take the lead and get the surrounding places to feel that Denison was trying to "hog" the proposition.

Arrangements were then made for a meeting of the breeders committee and the fair board. Mr. Barrow in calling the meeting to order stated that the breeders felt that Crawford county should have a fair of more capacity than what it now had, and that the breeders present wanted to meet with the fair board and formulate plans to either make the Arion fair stronger and larger or to get the fair board's cooperation in reorganizing and establishing a big county fair at Denison. In bringing the issue before the meeting Mr. Barrow emphasized that the breeders held nothing but good feeling toward the fair association, and that they appreciated the efforts of the fair board in the past.

C. P. Harvey, president of the fair association, explained that his association had offered their agricultural association charter twice to the county seat town, but for some reason or other no satisfactory agreement had been derived. This spring the fair association had offered their charter for \$4000.

Rev. Robt. Karr, for three years pastor of the Presbyterian church in Denison, tendered his resignation to the congregation at the service Sunday morning and at a congregational meeting to be held this evening it will be formally accepted. The resignation of the pastor did not come as a surprise to the members of the church who have known for some time that the minister's health was such that it would be necessary for him to seek another climate. During the war he was given a year's leave of absence and went to Denning, N. M., to engage in Y. M. C. A. work in hopes that the dry climate there would be of benefit to him. He, however, remained there but a short time and went to Colorado, where he spent several weeks in the mountains.

Rev. Karr has received two calls recently, one from Boulder, Colo., the other from Anaconda, Mont., and the latter one he has accepted. Only a few weeks ago he made a trip to Anaconda and for two Sundays occupied the pulpit of the Presbyterian church there and the congregation was so pleased with him that they extended him a call.
