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REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES

In last week's issue of the paper we commented upon some of the county candidates running for office on the republican ticket this year and we desire this week to speak of other candidates and from time to time until we have mentioned the list of candidates running for county offices on the republican ticket.

J. B. Lyon

Next in order we mention the name of J. B. Lyon, who was nominated at the primary for the office of county auditor. This office is an important one and Mr. Lyon was selected with reference to finding some one able to fill the office and to discharge with credit the duties of the same. J. B. Lyon needs no introduction to the people of Crawford county in view of the fact that he has been a prominent character here for a great many years. Prior to coming here his home was at Missouri Valley in Harrison county, so that he is practically a product of western Iowa. For a number of years he was engaged in business in Denison under the name of the Broadway grocery

and through his energy and ability established a very successful business which he conducted until a few months ago when he disposed of the same to Edith Stiles and her sister, who are now conducting the store. Mr. Lyon has impressed this county with the fact that he is a man not only of experience but of more than ordinary perseverance and capacity. He is a man of good address and able to acquire himself on the rostrum or other place. He filled the office of chairman of the Red Cross during a portion of the war and for several years was president of the Commercial club, which position he filled with credit to himself and all concerned. He is possessed of more than an ordinary amount of clerical ability and his general makeup is such that he would acquire himself with credit in the office of county auditor. We are sure that if Mr. Lyon succeeds at the election Crawford county will have the office presided over with dignity and ability and that in every respect he will prove himself a popular official.

C. A. Sykes

C. A. Sykes comes next on the list for county offices and is seeking election as clerk of the district court. This is an important office and one requiring a man of capacity and industry. Mr. Sykes has proved himself in his business career at Manilla that he is capable as a business man and rich in all qualities which are essential to a competent and successful clerk of the courts. If a man has succeeded a number of years in the mercantile business and has proved himself a reputable and successful business man it is safe to assume that the qualifications which have enabled him to succeed in business will contribute to his success in public office. Judging from this standpoint, Mr. Sykes is eminently qualified to make a splendid record as clerk of the courts. Our candidate for sheriff seems to be

popular with all factions this year. A. C. Greene has made a good record as sheriff during his first term and on his record alone he should be elected for a second term. He is not only active in the enforcement of the law but he seems to have a quality of character that enable him to discover infractions of the law where perhaps a less capable official would fail. After all, it is the law that protects the lives and property of individuals rather than buildings and enclosures however securely they may be constructed, and in order to make the law effective the guardians of the law should be wide awake and able to ferret out and discover infractions of the law and bring the offenders to justice. Mr. Greene is possessed of this qualification in an unusual degree. We do not recall a sheriff in this county who has been possessed of a keener insight into what the criminal world is planning on doing than our present sheriff. This respect for the lawbreakers and proves a valuable asset in favor of law and order. Mr. Greene is not a member of any party and order organization but he constitutes himself such an organization and is able to secure results. We do not believe the people of Crawford county will close their eyes to the record of such an official and allow partisanship to influence them rather than a desire to have the law enforced and the rights of the people protected.
