REPUBLICAN TOUR SUCCESSFUL

The tour of Crawford county Saturday last by the republicans was a great success from the standpoint of interest developed on the part of the people in the different localities which were visited. There would have been a larger delegation from Denison in the procession but for the fact that business appeared to some of the republicans who are our first class republicans when business does not interfere.

No doubt many of the leaders would have attended the meeting Saturday night at the gymnasium if it had not been for other attractions which appealed to them more than the interest in the party to which they belong. It was a fortunate thing that two splendid speakers were at the service of the republicans of the county on Saturday.

Ex-Senator Clapp who served in the United States senate for many years, from Minnesota, was here especially in the interest of Senator Cummins, Geo. Coe, ex-attorney general from Des Moines, was sent here to assist in the speaking. These gentlemen were both magnificent in their equipment and in the presentation of the issues of the campaign.

The people are wide awake and enjoy hearing the discussion of the issues of the campaign and show from the demonstration which they make that they are interested and thinking along the lines of the issues of the campaign. Judging by the expression of the crowds at different places the sentiment is altogether in favor of the republican candidate for president. It is not a hazardous thing to predict a republican majority in Crawford county so far as the head of the ticket is concerned.

The campaign on Saturday ended by a political speech by Senator Clapp at the gymnasium. There was a fair-sized audience considering it was Saturday night and several counter attractions were in town. Nearly all the people who attended were voters so that the speaker had the opportunity to present his arguments to those who were interested. He devoted a large part of his time to the senatorial campaign which is now going on in Iowa. Senator Cummins is a candidate on the republican ticket and Mr. Porter a candidate for the democratic party. The contest waged against Senator Cummins is based largely on the railroad law which was passed in making the railroad back from government ownership. It is generally conceded that it was a piece of folly for the democratic party to take over the railroad during the war and especially considering the way they were managed. It looks to one unprejudiced that the object in part at least was to place the operation of the railroad where the wages of the employees would be raised and this would furnish an excuse for increasing the railroad tariffs all at the expense of the people. President Wilson and Mr. McAdoo made themselves exceedingly popular with the railroad employees and the railroads by increasing the wages of one and the tariffs of the other.

There is a suspicion that the demo-

cratic leaders were in favor of holding the railroads by the government and preventing them being returned to private ownership, but the republicans were not so inclined and numerically were able to return them to private ownership. When it came to the preparation of the law, however, leaders of both parties worked to accomplish this purpose: the democrats and republicans worked alike for the perfection of a bill which would be just and right for all concerned. Senator Underwood of Alabama, Senator Fomeroy of Ohio, and Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, all democrats, worked with the republicans and the bill brought out by the committee was approved by them as well as the republicans. The contention on the part of those who are seeking to make political capital out of the bill, is that it guarantees for a period of two years at least a stipulated rate of interest for the railroad companies.

This is absolutely false and many of those who are contending that this is true are aware that there is no foundation for the claim. The only guarantee in the law was the rate of interest from March of this year to the first of September in order to close up the contract made by Woodrow Wilson with the railroads. After the first of September of this year there is no guarantee whatever that the railroads will make any particular rate of interest outside and beyond the general proposition which exists independent of the new law as the United States supreme court holds that the railroads must have the rate large enough not to be confiscatory.

Senator Cummins was never identified with the preparation of any law which reflected as much credit upon his courage, patriotism and ability as this law which is being criticized so readily by both political and prejudiced parties. All one has to do to discover the error of their contention is to read the law critically, but it is much easier to find fault than it is to investigate sometimes, hence the criticism.

The speaker's treatment on Saturday night of the league of nations was also along the line that republicans usually treat it; it is that the principle of the league is not objectionable, but the document presented by Mr. Wilson on his return from Paris as the league of nations is objectionable. No doubt if the instrument had been drawn up by leading statesmen of the United States it would have been acceptable to the American people, but inasmuch as Mr. Wilson concluded that the best method of procedure was to go himself abroad and supervise the preparation of the document so far as this country was concerned and took with him a class of men who he could readily dominate in thinking his own way, it is not strange that the American people find the measure objectionable in many respects. Inasmuch as Mr. Wilson did not consent to a change in any particular part of the measure it is not surprising that the people are against it. But when they vote they will not vote against the principles of an association of nations for peace, but simply vote against the Wilson measure. It sur-

renders the rights of the United States and practically nullifies the cherished doctrines of this country in several respects. The closing of the Saturday night speech made a full day for the republicans of Crawford county and no doubt the effect of the efforts will be heard from in the election.

It is perhaps proper to say there is a "new Richmond in the field." Miss Grace Meyers is out making political speeches and is in fact a real spell-binder. She was advertised to make a republican speech at Russell, Iowa, one night last week, and kept the engagement. It is needless to say she captivated her hearers and brought them all into the fold.
