THE MONEY ORDER OFFICE.

It does not appear to be generally known throughout the valley that there is a money order office established at this place, although it has been in operation for some time.

We are informed that a great many of our people are in the habit of transmitting money by registered letters, which is only a partial security against loss, and a source of great anxiety in case of miscarriage.

The money order system is the only really safe method of transmitting money, and it should be generally understood that such an office is in existence here, and that people can forward their money with the certainty that it will reach its destination if properly sent.

We are indebted to Mr. J. H. Taylor, Postmaster at Bozeman, for the following statement of the business transacted at that office for the year ending July 31st, 1872.

It presents a favorable showing of the general well-being of the community and is one of the inalienable signs of increasing prosperity. It will be observed that the amount of orders issued for the month of July this year is about four times that of orders issued in August 1871.

The following is the statement: No. of orders issued, 1000; Amount of orders drawn, \$28,534.00; Amount of orders paid, \$27,000.00; No. of orders issued, 3,000; Amount of orders drawn, \$3,477.00; Amount of orders paid, \$3,477.00.

THE RATES FOR MONEY ORDERS UNDER THE NEW POSTAL LAW ARE AS FOLLOWS: Orders not over \$10 five cents, over \$10 and not over \$20 ten cents, over \$20 and not over \$30 fifteen cents, over \$30 and not over \$40 twenty cents, over \$40 and not over \$50 twenty-five cents, over \$50 and not over \$100 thirty cents.
