Letter from Col. L. M. Black.

SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH, Nov. 22, 1872. DEAR CAPTAIN: I reached Corinne from Helena in eleven days by my own conveyance, and had quite a pleasant trip.

Before leaving Montana, I heard four millions named as the amount that would be required to build a North and South road to the business portion of the Territory.

THE NARROW GAUGE.

We publish to-day a letter from Col. L. M. Black, written during his stay in Salt Lake City, on his way to his home in St. Joseph, Mo., to which we have attention.

If there are other parties proposing to build a road from Ogden to Montana, we do not know it. We have heard a good deal lately of a North and South Road, but the projectors of it have not given us any information in regard to the plan or terms upon which they propose to build it.

There is no question as to the fact that such a proposition has been made in good faith, and will be fulfilled, if accepted on our part. We feel sufficiently authorized to give this assurance.

On motion of A. W. Tanner, Joseph Wright was appointed Secretary.

Whereas information has been received from a reliable source that John W. Young, President of the Utah Northern Railroad, has expressed his willingness to bring his Narrow Gauge Railroad to the business portion of Montana within one year, if the Territory will vote him one million of dollars in bonds.

The following gentlemen were appointed a committee to confer with Mr. Young: Dr. L. M. Black, Messrs. Story, Bogert, and Wright. Gen. Willson was added to the committee on motion of Maj. Bruce.
