HARD TIMES.—It may be somewhat complaining of those of our citizens who are complaining of hard times to learn that the present dull and almost lifeless state of affairs is doomed to a brief existence. It is most cheering to the miner, the farmer, the professional and business man, in fact to all to know that the Northern Pacific Railroad is now hard at work backed by Capital. This insures its speedy completion and gives us every reason to hope for good times and that ere long.

During the week we have seen several gentlemen from the Eastern States who assure us that we know absolutely nothing of hard times, that what we have deemed to call by that name is no more compared to the article they have in the States than the rags of a beggar to purple and fine linen or the wearing of golden and jeweled crowns.

Mr. Nichols, a gentleman who is a clear observer, says in speaking of Utah that for every dollar there is in circulation there are twenty men grasping; that the capital there is controlled by a few men and that the country is not by any means what it has been represented to be. From an impartial and unbiased view of the condition of the country at large, we feel that we but speak the truth when we say that no section of the Union has as good a prospect for a prosperous future as Montana, and that no place in the Territory possesses anything to be compared with the advantages of Bozeman.

JAIL DELIVERY. CAPTURE OF CHAS. CLAY.

On Monday morning our citizens were not a little surprised to learn that Charles Clay, who has been for some time confined in the county jail, for attempting to take the life of Constable Holt, had escaped. During the day Sheriff Gay, Under Sheriff Blakely and a number of Special Deputies were in search of the prisoner but could get no trace of him. Monday night it was so dark that no object could be distinguished even at a short distance and all efforts made that night to secure the capture of Clay proved to be vain. On Tuesday Clay went to the ranch of Mr. Chambers on Middle Creek where he was at once recognized and word was brought into town and his whereabouts made known by Mr. Howard, a Carpenter, who was working there. As soon as possible officers started in search of Clay and shortly after sundown on Tuesday he was brought into town by special deputies Thomas Lewis and C. L. Clark, Esq., from whom we learn that they found him secreted in a straw stack about a mile from Chambers' ranch. The discovery of his hiding place was purely accidental. Clark & Lewis were driving in a buggy when Lewis noticed that some cattle standing near the straw stack appeared to be looking at it as if some unknown occupant was there. They would approach the stack and then retire and look at it from the distance. Noticing this Lewis called his companion's attention to the fact and said "he is in there sure." They drove up to the fence when Clark got out and could see Clay in the act of raising up. No sooner did he get his eyes upon him than he told him to come out and give himself up or he would shoot. This persuasive argument had its good effect, and in a second Clay was in custody.

The escape of Clay is to be accounted for in but one way—some one helped him out but who did the deed is at present unknown. Clay says that he found an old file in the jail and with that succeeded in filing himself from his shackles, that he then took the handle off of a tin cup, opened the lock and escaped.—He says he had only one biscuit when he left and that no one helped him. This story is altogether "too thin." The shackles show that a new and sharp file was used and it is evident that the spring of the lock, a new one, had been broken. When Clay returned he wanted Under Sheriff Blakely to get him a new pair of pants, and gave him the money to get them. Blakely thought too much of his precious pot to go, but sent a gentleman who was standing by after the garment. The fact that Clay had money and provisions when captured shows most conclusively that he was assisted to escape, as he had no money at the time of his arrest nor has he honestly become possessed of any since.

Much credit is due to our officers and their assistants for the capture of Clay and it is to be hoped that he will not again desert his quarters till he leaves for Deer Lodge.

We are informed that every effort is being made to ascertain who are the accomplices of Clay, and that if they are detected they will receive the punishment they so justly merit. The refusal of our county commissioners to build a fence round the jail, seems to be an apt illustration of the old proverb, "Penny wise and Pound foolish." It certainly costs more to catch an escaped prisoner than to securely hold a dozen. The Sheriff desires us to acknowledge his appreciation of the services of Messrs. Tom, Lewis, Job Harvey and his under sheriff, Blakely, who were out all night (Monday). The public in general will be appreciative enough to award to them their full measure of praise. Under sheriff Blakely says that no more able assistance could have been rendered than that afforded by Job Harvey and Tom Lewis; that they worked like men and were not found wanting. But then, every one knows "there's good leather in every feller's," so we can only say, "Well done, good and faithful servants," your reward shall come, some day not far distant.
