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YELLOWSTONE

Wagon Road and Prospecting Expedition.

A large Expedition will leave Bozeman on or about February 10th, to locate a Free Wagon Road to Tongue River and generally survey and prospect the country between Bozeman and that point. It will go well equipped. Good men are invited to join it, and contributions of supplies are solicited. Men must come provided with arms, ammunition and supplies for a term of six months. Cattle, horse and mule teams will accompany it, and saddle outfits will be admitted. Those intending to accompany or contribute toward it must advise the Secretary fully immediately, and all men and material must report at Bozeman before February 10th.

Rich mineral deposits are believed to exist in the region referred to, and the best men of the Gallatin Valley are interested in, and have contributed \$5,000 toward, the movement, which is endorsed by Messrs. Gemmill and Sharp, of Madison, who have decided to move with this expedition.

As this enterprise will do much to develop the various resources of the lower country, induce immigration and encourage railroad and steamboat approaches, the interest of every citizen will be consulted by assisting by means of men and material.

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




