Geordan H. Campbell Was born in Chicago in 1836, and his father always claimed he was the first white child born in Chicago. He was liberally educated in Illinois by his parents, Jas. B. Campbell and Sarah Campbell. He afterwards removed to St. Charles, Mo., from which place he emigrated to Montana with his father's family in 1863. He first settled at Highland, Alder Gulch; and removed to Gallatin Valley in the fall of 1864. He was the first Assessor of Gallatin county, and also acted in the capacity of Deputy Collector at the same time. At the expiration of his term of office he engaged in merchandise at Gallatin City, which pursuit he was engaged in at the time of his death. He died at the Laclede Hotel, Bozeman, between 10 and 11 o'clock, a. m., Tuesday, April 16, of ascites, from which he had been suffering for some time past. He passed away very quietly sitting in a chair. His last words was a request to his attendant to send for his sister, Mrs. Dunbar, stating at the same time that he was about to die.

On the evening of his death Mrs. Dunbar and Henry H. Sherman arrived in town, and Mr. Campbell's remains were removed to Gallatin City for interment. He was a man well and favorably known throughout the Territory, and almost universally respected.

Organization of a Fair Association. According to previous arrangement a number of persons met at Odell Hall on Wednesday evening April 10th, 1878, for the purpose of organizing a fair association.

On ballot, the following persons were elected officers of the association for the ensuing term: President—Nelson Story; Vice President—Geo. W. Wakefield; Secretary—John V. Beget; Treasurer—Jas. G. Dow; Marshal—C. L. Clark.

The election of five directors for the organization was postponed until the next meeting.

C. L. Clark, Ira H. Pierce, and Walter Cooper were appointed a committee to draft by-law and present them at the next meeting.

Committees of five persons, viz.: Geo. W. Wakefield, C. W. Hoffman, C. L. Clark, Geo. Ash and Wm. Flannery were appointed by the chairman for the purpose of ascertaining where suitable ground can be obtained for the use of the association, its probable cost, and report to the next meeting; also what it will cost to erect a fence around it, and make a race-track on it one mile in length.

On motion, the meeting was adjourned until Saturday evening the 13th inst. at which time the committee on by-laws and ground for the use of the association, if requested further time, which was granted, and the meeting adjourned until Saturday evening, April 20th, when reports will be received from the above committees, nine directors elected, and such other business transferred as may be brought before the meeting.
