Tired of Living.

Charles Geschwindt, a tailor, who has been dissipating for some days past, on Tuesday morning attempted to suicide by shooting himself with a pistol. As he is the only living witness of the proceedings, we give his own version of the sad affair. He says that he was tired of living and wanted to put himself out of the way. He had no fire arms of his own, but remembered having seen a revolver, used for shooting beef cattle, and which was usually left in the slaughter house, a short distance below town. So on Tuesday morning last he repaired to the slaughter house, secured the revolver, which was loaded ready for use, placed its muzzle against his left breast, with the evident intention of shooting himself through the heart, and fired. The ball entered 2 or 3 inches above the left nipple, ranging downward, passed through the lungs and lodged somewhere, perhaps, in his back. After shooting himself he walked up to town and into his own room, adjoining W. H. Bailey's jewelry store, where he lay until Mr. Bailey, on inquiry he told what he had done, and stated his determination to try it again if he should be so unfortunate as to recover from his present hurt. He was finally persuaded to go to bed and have the wound examined and dressed, and was finally provided for by the county commissioners, and is liable to recover.

We have considerable sympathy and respect for the poor unfortunate man, for in his suicidal efforts he has manifested a contempt and regard for others very unusual with men of drunken and dissolute habits.

Latest from the Willow Creek Murderer.

From Judge McPherson, who returned from Willow Creek on Tuesday night, where he had been called to hold an inquest on the body of W. E. Fredricks, we learn that no knife was used by Foley, that he shot Fredricks with a No. 22-gauge that Fredricks must have discharged two shots from his revolver at Foley, and that after the shooting closed in upon his antagonist, threw him down, wrestled his gun from, and broke it over him, and strange to say, did not succeed in killing him before he himself fell from sheer exhaustion; but the strangest part of the story is to the effect that Ben. Wells was present during the entire shooting, with a Winchester rifle in the house within reach, and yet failed to interfere or render the least assistance during the fatal struggle.

We are informed that Wells is utterly unable to give any rational explanation for his strange conduct, but it is supposed he was so overcome by surprise and horror that he was rendered incapable of any effort on Fredricks' behalf. Fredricks, we learn, was unable to track the murderer except for a short distance from the house.

The coroner's inquest, held on the 16th inst., was, in substance, in accordance with the above.

Republicans Caucus.

A caucus of Republicans from various sections of the county was held in Bozeman on Tuesday evening, 17th inst. Wm. W. Alderson was called to the chair and C. Edwards was chosen secretary.

Resolutions were introduced by Elias Sperring in regard to the advisability of running a regular Republican ticket at the coming election, also resolving that the caucus elect delegates to the Republican Convention, to be held at Helena on the 24th inst., and select a Republican Central Committee for Gallatin County. Carried.

East Gallatin—Geo. D. Thomas. Delegates to the Territorial Convention were selected as follows: William W. Alderson, Alternate D. A. Kughen. Nelson Story, Alternate David Boerum. Richard Lockey, Alternate Elias Sperring. C. Edwards, Alternate J. H. Nixon.

The Democratic County Ticket.

The County ticket brought out by the Democratic County Convention, on Saturday last, caused considerable dissatisfaction inside of the party. It is claimed by many, that with very few exceptions, it is a very weak ticket, and that the action of the Convention did not fairly represent or reflect the sentiments or wishes of the party.

The defeat of J. D. McCaman, who appeared to be the first choice of the people, for County Treasurer, irrespective of party, is severely criticised and very generally condemned. The "sugar plum" offered to McCaman in the shape of a nomination to the Territorial Legislature, we are informed, is very properly and indignantly refused by both McCaman and his friends. McCaman has sense enough to know that he is not cut out for the Legislature, and positively declines to run.

Proceedings of the Gallatin County Democratic Convention.

The delegates met in Bozeman at Young Men's Hall on Saturday, Sept. 14th. The convention was called to order at 12:30 p. m. by S. W. Langhorne, chairman of the central committee.

On motion and vote, Wm. H. Bailey was selected as chairman, and John McLeod, of East Gallatin, as secretary.

After appointing committees on credentials and order of business, the convention adjourned until 2 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The report of committee on credentials was read and approved. Number of delegates in attendance, 21.

On motion and vote James Ferrel, of Hayden, was authorized to represent Yellowstone Precinct No. 1. On motion and vote V. A. Cockrell was authorized to represent West Gallatin Precinct.

The report of the committee on order of business was read, amended, and approved as amended.

The first order of business was the nomination and election of persons as candidates for the various county offices, and resulted as follows:

For CORONER, J. C. Switzer was nominated, and was elected by acclamation.

For TREASURER, J. D. McCaman and Wm. Fly were nominated. An informal ballot was taken, with the following result: McCaman, 12; Fly, 13. A formal ballot was then taken, at which McCaman received 11 votes and Fly 14. On motion and vote, Wm. Fly was declared the unanimous choice of the convention.

For COUNTY CLERK and RECORDER, S. W. Langhorne and R. W. Crawford and S. M. Reed were nominated. On informal ballot 25 votes were cast, as follows: Langhorne, 7; Main, 7; Crawford, 6; Reed, 5. On first formal ballot, Langhorne received 10 votes, Crawford 6, Main 5, and Reed 4. No choice. On second ballot, Langhorne received 12, Main 6, Crawford 6, and Reed 1. No choice. On third ballot, Langhorne received 15, Main 5, Crawford 5, Langhorne was then declared, by acclamation, to be the unanimous choice of the convention.

While the voting for County Clerk and Recorder was going on, a telegram from Helena was received, reading: "The Democracy of Deer Lodge instructed for Maginnis." It was handed around with another received earlier in the day, to the effect that Lewis and Clarke, Meagher, Chouteau and Missoula had instructed for Maginnis.

The reading of these dispatches caused a broad grin of satisfaction on the faces of the supporters of that gentleman.

For PROBATE JUDGE, A. D. McPherson was nominated by acclamation.

For SHERIFF, T. B. Warfield, W. D. McKensie and Harry Rea were nominated. On informal ballot, McKensie received 14 votes, Rea 5, Warfield 5. On formal ballot, McKensie received 17, Warfield 6, Rea 2. McKensie was then declared, by acclamation, to be the unanimous choice of the convention.

For COUNTY SURVEYOR, S. M. Reed was nominated by acclamation.

For COUNTY COMMISSIONERS the following persons were nominated: George L. Duke, James Martin, John M. Robinson, A. J. Hunter, Joseph Lindley, Horace Anis and Walter Cooper. An informal ballot was taken, with the following result: Duke 20, Anis 19, Robinson 11, Hunter 3, Lindley 2, Martin 12, Cooper 11, Scattering 5. Ties for five minutes.

Called to order. Ballot was then taken for first choice for county commissioner, with the following result: Duke 10, Martin 9, Robinson 2, Anis 2, Cooper 1. No choice. On second ballot, Martin received 13, Duke 10, Anis 2. Martin elected. The result of this ballot was greeted with applause, and Mr. Martin was declared, by acclamation, to be the unanimous choice of the convention.

Ballot was then taken for second County Commissioner, as follows: Duke 18, Robinson 6, Anis 1. By an acclamation vote, Mr. Duke was declared the unanimous choice of the convention.

Moved and seconded that John M. Robinson be declared the unanimous choice of this convention for the third County Commissioner. Lost. A ballot was then taken, with the following result: Robinson 15, Anis 8, Duke 2. Robinson elected. The following result was then declared, by acclamation, to be the unanimous choice of the convention.

For REPRESENTATIVES, J. D. McCaman, C. W. Haskins, A. L. Corby and Wm. Flannery were nominated. The ballot for first choice resulted as follows: McCaman 13, Haskins 7, Corby 4. For second choice Haskins received 14, Corby 6, Flannery 4. Both Mr. McCaman and Mr. Haskins were then declared, by acclamation, to be the unanimous choice of the convention to represent Gallatin County in the next two sessions of the Legislature.

For COUNTY CLERK, W. O. P. Hays was nominated by acclamation.
