Virginia City News. From Judge Theo. F. Muffly, of Virginia, who is taking a business and pleasure look at Deer Lodge this week, we have the following items from the Capital: On Tuesday evening, July 12th, about dusk, three of the Territorial prisoners confined in the Madison county jail effected their escape by burrowing under the walls of the building, having previously, by the removal of a portion of their cell walls, gained admittance to the outer hall.

Small Fox.—A note from Captain Jan H. Mills, dated "Newman", Tuesday 12, 12:30 a. m., contains the following: "There are now lying three miles below Mr. Charley McCarty on the Missouri road, two men, very well armed. Neither are able to stand, and they are terribly broken out with the leaden disease. One has no shelter save a brush cover, and no medical or other assistance save that given by Charley McCarty, who found them on Sunday, lying by the road, removed them to a little distance from it, and, being well liked, gave them such assistance as he can. As we came past on the coach Sunday a fatal case of cholera broke out among the prisoners. It is one of the most distressing occurrences I have ever been cognizant of. They are in Missouri county, and I am requested to solicit the attention of the County Commissioners, which I shall do. They received some robes from Indiana at Spread Eagle Bar, when coming up the river, and one who had an abrasion of the flesh on his leg, was thereby infected."
