Saturday's Dispatches.

Domestic. Richmond, November 4th—A meeting of ex-confederate soldiers was held here last night with reference to the Lee monument.

Fortress Monroe, November 4th—The U. S. steamer Diana has been craning off the pier for the past day or two looking out for a French cruiser which is rumored to be there to pick up German vessels.

Hartford, November 4th—A match game of billiards was played last evening by Cyril Dion and B. N. Denison, champion of Mass., one thousand points.

New York, November 4th—The non-arrival of the steamer Blake, now 18 days and from 15000 hours behind schedule, suggests a possibility of disaster to that vessel.

Augusta, Me., November 4th—Senator Morrill remains very low. A consultation of his physicians was held last night, and they report he is suffering from complete nervous prostration.

Paris in Paris. London, November 4th—Late advices from Paris give particulars of the disturbances which occurred there Monday last. A formidable riot occurred by the enemies of an autocrat.

Capture of Dijon. Berlin, November 4th—The capture of Dijon is confirmed by official dispatches from General Werder.

Paris in Tarnool—The Ustahlo City. Paris, November 2d—News of the capitulation of Metz was given to the public here today.

THE DEATH OF JACOB SCHLÖTTER. Remarkable Developments.

The following letter was received last evening from the proprietor of the House in Chicago at which Mr. Schlötter died:

CHICAGO, Oct. 29th, 1870. Your answer by telegram is received. I answer by telegram and by letter.

Henry Scherer, Dean Sir: The particulars of the death of Jacob Schlötter are as follows: He arrived at my House, Tuesday, R. M., Oct. 20th. He stated he had not been well on the way, but did not complain materially after arriving here.

He retired to bed about 10 P. M., the same evening. The chambermaid wishing to clean his room, at 10 A. M. the following morning, could not obtain an answer from him.

It was at once reported to the office and an entrance forced in the room by way of the transom over the door. When the transom was opened it was at once discovered that he had blown out the gas instead of turning it off, and consequently he was found in a dying condition.

Medical aid was at once called in and every effort made to restore the man, but the gas had done its work, and he died on Monday morning at 12.30.

On Saturday he was quite sensible and we had good prospects of his early recovery, but on Sunday he began getting weak, and continued to do so until he expired Monday morning. He continued to remark to within an hour of his death that he felt pretty well. I saw Mr. Summers this A. M., and all arrangements will be made according to advice.

There was found in his bed \$427 in currency. That is all the money he had except some gold dust and silver quartz. I am, Yours, Respectfully, JACOB BECKER, Washington House.

To Mrs. Jacob Schlötter, P. B. He stated that he was of the Catholic religion, and requested us to call a priest, which we did, and he received absolution about 2 hours before he died. I gave the priest \$200 to read mass for his soul.

I am Clerk of the House, N. M. McCARTY, Washington House, Chicago. I would like a letter from you to answer to this. Address in my name.

MCCARTY. We give the above letter in full. It is well understood here that Mr. Schlötter took at least some \$4,000 or \$7,000 in dust with him, which is still unaccounted for.

The currency in his possession was only a few dollars, and he was very poor. Besides, the extreme liberality manifested in paying money for masses that there was left for living expenses suggests a suspicion of integrity, the more so as Mr. Schlötter was not a Catholic as attested by the Father here.

It must be recollected that a desire for money is the incentive to many great crimes. Schlötter had money—lots of it. It is unaccounted for. It would be well to look the matter up, that innocent parties may be exonerated and the guilty, if found, punished.

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A Sauterie Between Mexico.

From the Nevada City (Mo.) Times.

A gentleman was in our town yesterday who had just returned from Old Mexico, and had with him a boy fourteen years of age that is almost as great a curiosity as any respect except his feet, each of which consists of only two long toes, the great and the small toe. The foot is cast from the ankle, and forms the separate toes, each toe about six inches long. The joints of the toes appear stiff from walking on them.

The toes and foot, of which there is nothing but a heel, resemble the thumb and fore-finger of the hand, both toes of the same length, and he can grip a piece of coin or copper with the ends of them somewhat as a crawfish would. He is very pleasant and intelligent. The gentleman with him said his whole family, father, mother, brothers and sisters were all formed the same way, and they claimed to belong to a tribe in Central Mexico, whose feet were all formed the same as theirs.

The Seattle Intelligencer of the 3d inst., has the following regarding the N. P. R. R. survey through Snoqualmie Pass: Maxwell's party had on Tuesday reached a point on the Snoqualmie river forty-four miles distant from this city, and about eighteen miles distant from the summit of the Cascade range.

The grade along Cedar river averages about thirty-five feet to the mile, and they have now attained an altitude of something over 1,000 feet above the water. The line leaves Cedar river at Rattlesnake Prairie, crossing thence to the South Fork of the Snoqualmie, a distance of about three miles. When our informant left, the survey had left Grouse Ridge, or Perkin's Backbone, as it sometimes is called.

Ever since leaving Russell's place, the progress of the party has been much impeded by the dense mass of undergrowth and fallen timber which they have encountered. For a distance of at least twenty-five miles they have had to cut their way through the forest. With the exception of such obstacles they have experienced no difficulty, and find the route entirely feasible.

As before stated, this party will extend their survey only as far as the headwaters of the Yakima river, on the other side of the Pass, when they will return.

Prince Amadeo, second son of the King of Italy, is willing to accept that mischievous honor, the throne of Spain. The Prince bears a name—God-lover—which has always been a favorite in the house of Savoy, and wears the title of the Duke of Aosta, which is good enough for a title, but in point of revenue can be happily exchanged for that of King of Spain.

The Prince is twenty-five years old, and has for wife the Princess Maria, daughter of Prince Ponsé. They have one child, Carlo, yet a mere infant. The Prince has no extraordinary characteristics, has never done anything remarkable, and may have good enough stuff in him to make a king for so long a time as Spain will need that monarch.

ERRORS RESPECTING THE DEAD.—The Lexington, (Va.) correspondent of the New York Herald says: The press has generally fallen into an egregious error as to the name of General Lee's also as to the date of his birth. His name was Robert Edward Lee, and not Edmund, as everyone here published, except in the Baltimore Sun, and he was born on the 6th day of January, 1806, and not on the 19th of January, 1808, as papers have it. This information comes from a nephew of the General, who bears his name, and it was bequeathed to him by his grandmother, who entered it on the fly-leaf of his Bible. The mistake as to the name originated with Mr. Wm. Cate, author of Gen. Lee's biography.

Another land is ready to jolt us. The Canadians are scarcely through rejoicing over the addition of the Province of Manitoba to the Dominion, when we hear that an agent of the Red River people is en route to Washington to ask the United States to intercede with Great Britain against the cruelties of the gentle Canadians and permit the new Province to join the great Republic. The intercession is more likely to be granted than the annexation.

Ex-Governor Seymour has addressed the Buffaloists in behalf of the Erie Canal. The President captured and abandoned Bogot.

AD the Paris papers except the Revue and Courier favor armistice. The Quebec parliament opened on Friday. The Assembly of France is to meet Nov. 15 to ratify and guarantee terms of peace.

The statement that Austria had interceded in favor of the Pope is officially denied. Gen. Clinch, at Marshall, reinstated George Foyote Train as General-in-Chief of the National Guard.
