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CARBON MOOR.

AN INTERESTING LETTER FROM THE PITTSBURG OF THE ROCKY MOUNTAINS.

Special Correspondence of the New North-West. CARBON MOOR, Sept. 7, 1879. - But few spots in Montana have escaped notice at the hands of the wide-awake correspondents of the New North-West, but this section of Deer Lodge county is an exception.

The hills are covered with quartz shales, and on the eastern side of the North Fork of the Little Blackfoot, is situated Klocken's Gulch. During the past ten years this place has been noted for its coal, and it is but reasonable to predict a sufficient amount of paying ground yet remains to keep him employed for the same term of years.

At Hope Gulch, five miles above, four companies are busily engaged working their placer claims, and are deriving a fair remuneration for the work bestowed.

Butler's North on Meadow creek, a tributary of the North Fork, is being vigorously worked by Mr. Butler and Andy O'Connell. Their ground is valuable property, which is proven by the fact that Butler for the past ten, and O'Connell for the past five, years has been pegging away on their claim and losing no time in assaying to buy a purchaser.

COMMISSIONER'S PROCEEDINGS. September Term, 1879.

WEDNESDAY, Sept. 3. - Board cancelled warrants and orders on different funds and estates of deceased persons, as returned by Long Coleman, County Treasurer.

Settlement was made with W. L. McKinley, Road Supervisor of District No. 1, and warrant ordered drawn for amount found due him.

Board accepted and approved bond of Simon Hauswirth, Treasurer of Butte Fire Brigade.

The petition of E. S. Stackpole and others requesting that the alley running north and south between blocks 29 and 30 in the town of Deer Lodge be vacated, and that Rev. R. DeLybeckere have leave to enclose the same, was received and the petition was not granted.

Report of M. R. Hayes, J. P. of Ophir township, showed amount of fines collected by him to be \$12. Report received and ordered placed on file.

Board examined and allowed accounts on County, Contingent and Poor funds.

The petition of Phil E. Evans and others requesting a change in the road leading on the west side of the Deer Lodge river, known as the lower road to Race Track, be made as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a point at the N.W. corner of Conrad Kohrs' ranch known as the Millot ranch, running thence in a northerly direction in a straight line until it intersects the main road from Deer Lodge to Butte on or near the south bank of Powell creek, was read. Satisfactory proof being made to the Board that notice had been given according to law, it was ordered that R. G. Humber, Wm. Walker and M. B. Miller be appointed to view and lay out said road on Saturday, Sept. 13, or within five days thereafter.
