The estate approximates \$10,000, and those who have met Mr. O'Hanlon are pleased the legacy fell to one who has made so favorable an impression.

Rev. E. M. Stevenson and Mr. Davis Willard, of Roseman, who with the bloom of youth got on his face what we remember as a valued correspondent of the Montana Post twenty years ago--stopped off a day on their return from Presbytery to visit the College of Montana. Roseman is instituting an Academy this year, of which Prof. Matson is to be Principal, and they desired to witness the workings of the College.

Mr. Nelson Bennett, the energetic contractor in charge of the 9,500 foot tunnel on the Northern Pacific through the Cascade Mountains, arrived in Deer Lodge, sixteen days from Tacoma, where he tells of struggles in bloom and other things new and strange to mountain--ears. He is working the tunnel from each end and has the most approach in about 2,000 feet, timbering as he goes, through basaltic rock.
