

COLLEGE OF MONTANA.

The Commencement Exercises Prove Very Interesting—A Good Attendance. The Commencement exercises of the College of Montana took place on Sunday, June 12, at 3 o'clock p. m. The choir sang "O, Be Joyful in the Lord." The sermon was preached by the president of the college.

The exercises of commencement week have been very interesting. Judge DeGoes failed to reach Deer Lodge on account of the washouts on the railway and the program of Monday evening was omitted. The concert of Tuesday evening was of very high grade, the selections being especially excellent. The instrumental pieces were very well rendered, showing the most careful training. The recitation of the young ladies deserves especial mention and shows that the instruction in this character will compare with any of our eastern universities. The vocal instruction is a worthy activity.

The solos, Glee and quartets, were without exception rendered in the very best manner, showing a quality of voice, a natural bearing, a beauty of phrasing and a knowledge of general effects which reflect great credit upon Miss Terry. The quartets composed of Miss May Woodcock, Miss Brainer, Miss Grayell and Miss Smith were crowned with an honor which also is due to Miss Grayell and Miss Brainer. The soloists, by their excellent work they have done in their respective departments.

The address of the commencement was a pronounced success. The principal selections, the essays, orations and declamations were of a very high order and were without exception well rendered. It is expected that several of the orations and essays will be published.

The graduating exercises took place Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. There were 50 graduates from the school of mines. Mr. George Motion and Mr. D. W. Hartman were the recipients of the degree of Bachelor of Mines, which were conferred by the president of the college. Mr. John O. Bates received a certificate in mining.

The orations of the graduates were very peaceful and reflected great credit upon both. Mr. Metcher's oration was upon "The Engineer" while Mr. Hartman took his cue for his subject "American Principles." They were followed by a social song, "Goodbye," by Miss Don Grayell.

Governor Toole, then gave a very eloquent address, which was enjoyed by the audience. The governor had luncheon with Dr. E. W. Thompson. The other invited guests were Rev. James Reid, the pastor, and Mr. D. C. Walker, Deer Lodge. The governor visited the university and then attended the president's reception at the college parlors.

President Reid leaves for Helena tonight, after the closing address of the Assembly, commencing tomorrow evening.

The New Northwest acknowledges with thanks the receipt of a cordial invitation to participate in the Fourth of July celebration to be held in Butte. Sorry, but in previous engagements in Deer Lodge will prevent our attendance.

Outwashed week and its branches, which ran through several sections of Deer Lodge, were very on the rampage the past week. So far as the damage has been done beyond the immediate vicinity occasioned by the overflow on north Main street, water comes from various parts of the county, however, that the main stream are swollen beyond precedent and that many county bridges are washed away or damaged. The county will be put to great expense to replace and repair these structures.

The office of city policeman was abolished at the last meeting of the town council. Other business transacted was the allowance of mayor bills, the approval of Street Commissioner Law's report, and the recorder was instructed to notify those delinquent in the matter of building showings previously ordered that if they were not complied with, the same would be forfeited. New sidewalks were also ordered on the east side of B street from Second to Seventh, and B street from Seventh to Seventh was ordered graded, as was also Second street from A to C.

The Philadelphia Mail goes in a timely protest against the mail service as it now exists between the Berg and this place. The Mail is eminently right. There is something radically wrong when four days' time is required to get a letter from one point to the other. The New Northwest writer agrees with the Mail, too, in the opinion that the fault does not lie with any of the post offices; that it rests with the Northern Pacific, one clause of whose agreement with the government is in effect that it will transport the mails with all reasonable dispatch.

The recent high water caused the dam at the foot of Gill lake to give way and as a result several fine ranches are practically ruined. The lake covered an area of from seventy to eighty acres and has not been considered safe for some time past. G. Holzerbeck, it is said, sustained the most serious loss, mud and debris having covered all his land to a considerable depth, rendering it worthless. The Blessinger, Doveney, Kaiser and Perri man ranches are also seriously damaged. Much sympathy is felt for those who have sustained losses.

There will be a meeting of all cyclists in Montana at Deer Lodge on the Fourth. The prizes for senior riders will consist of two gold medals valued at \$75 each; the boys' race is for \$35 and \$10. The races take place in the afternoon on a splendid bicycle track. There are about seventy-five members in the Montana branch of the League of American Wheelmen. Twenty-five cyclists, not members of the league, will also participate in the

big parade which occurs in the morning. Several wheelmen of the American League have accepted the invitation tendered them by the Deer Lodge people. —Amconda Standard.

THE RECENT STORM.

Railroad business demoralized—Heavy snows in the mountains.

The heavy and prolonged rain which set in Wednesday of last week and continued for several days, and a most demoralizing effect on railroad traffic. Numerous bridges and culverts were washed out on the Montana Central, Northern Pacific and Montana Central, between Deer Lodge, Butte and Helena, and no mail communication with the latter place was possible until Tuesday night and then only by way of the Montana Central. Incoming trains on the Northern Pacific could get no farther than Garrison, and as a result some three or four hundred passengers were delayed there for a day or two and the commissary facilities of the town were taxed to the utmost. For two days Montana Union trains ran no farther north than Deer Lodge. Freight traffic on all roads was practically suspended in this portion of the state and is not yet fully established.

Concurrent with the rains in the valleys, there have been heavy snows over all the mountain ranges of the state, and it is conceded by all old timers that never before has there been so much snow in Montana. The mountains on all sides of this city are still covered with the white mantle, and on the higher peaks to reach an extent that much of it will remain during the entire summer. Thursday night of last week our mountain snow fell in Champagne and on the range east of Zosel, where it is not much.
