PRESIDENTIAL POLICIES.

The distribution of the offices by President Cleveland has been very slow. In some quarters the reaction is highly commended, and highly so, if the point from which it is viewed is the correct one.

It has also been noticed that there has been a decided change in President Cleveland's methods of dispensing the public patronage. Senators and representatives have been made to feel that they need not expect to have much more to do in the parceling out of the offices than the ordinary citizen.

Some people read all this simply as proof that President Cleveland is disciplining congress for the purpose of rendering it subservient to his will. If only a few instances are furnished of patronage following an abandonment of opinion on a leading issue, it is thought that a congressional stampede will surely take place.

Twice already President Cleveland has suffered previous defeat at the hands of congress on this vexed question. His proposition to stop the coinage of standard dollars when he was just about entering on his first term, and his proposition to repeal the Sherman act at about the same date in his second term, were not only rejected, but treated with something like derision.

SECOND INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION MEETS.

And Proceed to the Consideration of the Important Question of Freer Trade Relations Between Canada and the States—Mayor Eustis Temporary Chairman—Speeches by Ex-Governor Burke and Others.

ST. PAUL, June 5.—The second international reciprocity convention began in the big auditorium at 2 p. m. Monday. About 500 delegates attended the opening session, and from lists given to the secretaries, it is certain that nearly 1,000 delegates will attend the sessions after Monday.

President Burke's Address. Gentlemen of the Convention: In making this convention for the second time, I take pleasure in congratulating you upon the splendid gathering, the numbers and personnel of which will do much to further the objects for which you are called together.

General Weaver was elected first vice chairman and Judge Thomas H. Walker of Pennsylvania second vice chairman. Delegate Davis of Minnesota offered a resolution that the convention call itself the "Anti-Trust Association" to be made an international one by the different states.

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
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Welfare and Prosperity.

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
