SOURCE OF GREAT WEALTH.

What a Newspaper Says of the Great
Fairbaven Coul Mine.

Through the courtesy of C. X. Larrabee, president of the Pairbaven Land

The shaft has under the present tunnel. The shaft has been cross-cut at different places, revealand showing a width of twenty four feet clear coal at the bottom of the shaft. The timel has a top of 300 feet, thus giving an exposed surface of 200 feet, the coal increasing in quality as the descent was made. Within a distance of 120 feet north from the Jennings vein another large vein has been upened and found to be a good coal for coking and domestic purposes, thus giving, at a conservative estimate, a volume custly amounting to half a million tons within sight, a sufficient quantity to supply the cuttre Pacific coast, and furnishing the foundation of President Hill's remark that Fairhaven would one day prove the leading coal would one day prove the leading coal shipping part of the Northwest. Near the present working a large voin of blacksmith coal has also been discovered, the tests of which give the most esti-factory results and which hids his to speedily supply a large and growing marker.

speedily supply a large and growing market.

The coal secured from the Eairhaven mine sistains an excellent quality for coking, steam, gas and domestic purposes. Recent tests made by the Great Northern road have been of such a nature as to result in a contract for the supply of the coast lines. With respect to its coke producing qualities it would be difficult to overcealmate its morits. Experts pronounce its coke superior to any manufactured or the coast, and give it equal rank with the famous coke of Connellsville, Pa., which is said to have no superior in the United States. D. C. Boyee, the well known coal and from expert of the department of mines and mining at the World's fair, forwarded to the Fairbaver.
