Union Meeting at Lockport.

A meeting was held at Lockport on Saturday, which was largely attended by men of all former party proclivities. Speeches were made by Petnam Brown, Esq. Capt. B. W. HANNA and Col. W. K. EDWARDS, of this city. These gentlemen made effective and stirrring appeals in behalf of the Union and the Constitution, which were heartily resoonded to by the audience. The general tone of sentiment in Riley township is loyal and patriotic. The efforts of political "soreheads" to get up an anti-war feeling there have been fruitless and vain as elsewhere .-The men of that locality declare for their Government and against all traitors at home

Crittenden Compromise.

Mr. Carrenden, it seems, has wholly abandoned his compromise measures. He occupies his place in Congress, in a quiet and dignified manner, voting squarely and constantly with the Union men, to support the Government and prosecute the war. This course of his ought to take "the wind out of the sails" of the hypocritical crew who are whining throughout the country and singing hallelujahs to his deceased compromise. Mr. CRIPTENDEN does not over act as chief mourn er to it. We doubt if he loses any rest because his plan was not adopted. He has no sympathy with the "small potatoe" traitors of the North who are weeping over the failure of his compromise. The circulation of petitions for the enactment of his dead idea into a positive law, by the corrupt partisans of the North, must be a laughable occurrence to the old gentleman-if he knows anything about it! It is a very decided waste of stationary. Mr. CRITTENDEN, we think, will advocate no compromise, of his own or any body's else, until the traitorous rebels lay down their arms and hang their leaders,-They are badly duped, who think otherwise. The War.

The telegraphic despatches, in this issue, render it quite probable that Gen. McCLELLAN has, by this time, succeeded in driving the enemy out of Western Virginia, and that it has now been restored to the hands of leval men. The affair at Roaring Run, and the operations about Laurel Hill have reflected great credit upon his division. The Indiana troops are entitled to no mean share of the honor of the campaign. They have behaved nobly in every battle and have presented to the foe their steady columns like veteran

Gen. McClellan has reached Beverly, the county town of Randolph county, and has taken up his head quarters there. General Monais was in command of the rear brigade, of the division, and was advancing towards Beverly. Matters therefore in Western Virginia are very satisfactory. There is nothing very important from the columns of the army operating South from Washington City as a base. There has as yet been no decided movement. It is probable that one will take place, in the course of a day or two, which will develop the plan of the campaign more clearly than is now known by the public. Southern forces. The gallant action of Col. Store near Carthage Missouri, has about ruined secession in Missouri. General Lyon is advancing rapidly towards the Arkansas line with his command, and it is probable that there will be no further fighting soon in that quar-

The recent hold conduct of secessionists in Kentucky, in openly recruiting for the Confederate army, under the even of the State authorities, together with other indications. cause the apprehension that a civil strife may soon arise in that State similar to that in Miscouri. It is to be hoped that the Union sentiment is strong enough to prevent this occur-

Altogether the war is progressing as rapid ly and as favorably to the cause of the Union. as should be expected. It may not meet the popular desire as to rapidity of movement or brilliancy of execution, but the certainty of speedy and sure ultimate success is daily strengthening. The armies of the Union are in good hands. They are constantly advancing to victory, whenever the Rebels will stand long enough to meet them. The confidence of patriots, all over the land is becoming stronger in the ability of the government to "crush out" the horrible and unpatural rebellion. It will be done' It is only a quest tion of time!

WHEN the oath of office had been adminstered to Mr. Grow, as Speaker of the House of Representatives, on taking the chair he said, after alluding in eloquent terms to the progress of our country from small beginning

A RICH PRIZE.-We believe it has been nnounced by telegraph, that the Quaker City had captured a vessel off Charlestonwith a cargo designed for the rebels. It seems to have been a valuable prize according to a letter published in the Boston Jour-nal from Newport News. It states that the vessel was a New York clipper built ship, loaded with forty thousand stand of arms, a number of brass rifled cannon, and a large quantity of ammunition, all valued at \$600, 000. This report is amply confirmed by an extract of a letter in the New Haven Palladium, from Lieut. Henry Benham of the Navy Brigade, dated Fortress Monroe, June 26th, which states that there was a European ship captured and brought into that port for attempting to run the blockade at Charleston; also that she had forty thousand stand of arms, besides other freight which proved valuable. The Government has been in expectation of the arrival of a large amount of war material destined for the Southern Confederacy, and it is very probable that the above prize is the same referred to by the correspondent of the New York Times on

board the Niagara, who says:
"We are detailed for the Northern Divisi- Classick James ion of the blockading squadron at first, and it was only an absolute necessity of the Deartment that we were ordered away from Christy R W Charleston for the purpose of systematizing Cole Ebenezer the squadron in the Gulf, and to intercept Cox Joel arms from Belgium for the Montgomery Government, which were to leave Bath about the 1st of May for Mobile or New Orleans. They have not yet arrived, but are now due. Fifty thousand stand of arms are expected and anxiously looked for by the rebels. "I would like to see them get 'em-wouldn't you? We may be on our way North when the Mississippi arrives."

MR. W. W. MILLER, of the sloop-of-war Iroquois, who lately arrived from the Mediterranean squadron, has returned to Wheelng, his home, where he has communicated to the Intelligencer some most important revelations with regard to the secret efforts made to corrupt the officers of the Mediterranean squadron as long ago as last Decem-ber. He states that Capt. D. N. Ingraham, (a South Carolinian, since resigned) then in command of the fleet, invited a number of other officers to meet him on the 20th of December last at Spezzia, and that he (Miller) was one of those so invited and present. The result of this session was not satisfactory, and another was held at Genoa in January. At this conclave. Ingraham and several more determined to desert the service and join the rebels, and as an inducement to Mr. Miller to join them, they told him that this movement in the South would soon end in a Monarchy; that that was the design; and that all who now went over would be made noblemen and given high preferments. As soon as this was announced, Mr. Miller left their council board, telling them that he intended to live and die beneath the flag he was sailing under. After that, they had no further
