If any vessel shall violate or attempt to violate the provisions of this act, the said vessel, cargo, and everything appertaining thereto, shall be forfeited, the one half to go to the captors and the other half to the United States, and every person is hereby a few shells into Sewall'ss Point and the Pig authorized to make such seizure, and the Captain or commander of such vessel shall be fined not exceeding five hundred dollars.
