The Herald's New Orleans correspondent of the 12th says it is reported Forrest and Dick Taylor have joined forces and number 20,000. Gen. Ghosson's command is also said to have joined them. Great secrecy is maintained concerning their movements.

News received at Buffalo, on the 20th inst., state that a number of Rebels from Canada captured the little steamers Parsons and Island Queen near Bass Island yesterday afternoon, and have gone down or across the lake probably for re-enforcements, guns and ammunition. The capturing party numbered about thirty, armed with revolvers and bowie knives. No other arms noticed. They took at Middle Bass Island wood enough to last two days.

THE QUANTITY OF BUTTER INCREASED BY WATER.—A New York dairyman furnishes the following advice for the Genesee Farmer: There has been a great deal said about butter-making, but I thought, as I had a little experience, I might offer a few hints that may be of use to some of your many readers. When cows are feeding on dry feed, the milk is thicker or richer than when feeding on juicy grasses; then add warm water, when setting the milk, in quantities sufficient to make it as the milk from ordinary cows in May or June. The milk from some cows in the spring and summer months is very thick or rich; then add cold water, if the weather be hot. I have practiced the above, and it has increased the quantity from one to three pounds per cow each week.

NOTICE To the Tax-Payers of Mason County. BY an act of the General Assembly it is made my duty, immediately after the 1st of June, to proceed with the Collection of the public Revenue as speedily as possible. By the same act it is made my duty to report, at the July, September and November County Courts, the amount of taxes collected and pay the same over to the Auditor. I am authorized under said act to notify the Tax-Payers by public notice such up at the Court house door, and in the different Precincts or districts of the County, that on certain days between the 1st of October, and the 15th of November, I, or my deputies, will attend at the place of holding election in such districts and receive their taxes. It is made the duty of the tax-payer to attend on such days and pay the same. If this is not done, after that date they will have to pay the same at the Court house; and, if not done there within the time prescribed by law, ten per cent, upon the amount is added. Thus it will be seen that it will be to the interest of the tax-payer to pay their taxes as they are paid, within the time prescribed by law, as after that time I shall invariably add the ten per cent, imposed by law, to their bills when I come to collect. This I shall be compelled to do as I shall have to advance the Revenue due by such delinquents and enforce payment at once with the costs to reimburse myself. By paying attention to the matter and promptness, the thing will work first rate. The people have the same time, as heretofore, within which to pay their taxes. The only difference being, that they shall give the matter attention themselves and see to its payment at the times and places prescribed, instead of the old way of having the Sheriff call half dozen times, more or less, for their taxes. The law is plain, simple, and to the point; and I intend to comply with its provisions and enforce its penalties, and this notice is given to call the attention of the people to it, so that no harm may be done any one, in consequence of their ignorance of the law. The time and place at which I, or my deputies, will attend in the different Precincts to receive taxes between the 1st of October, and the 15th of November, will be advertised by public notice stuck up as required by law. In the mean time, let every one pay up that can when called upon between this and that time, that a good account of the promptness of the people of the county may be reported to the auditor at the July and September terms of our Court.
