Nearly every day during the past month we have licked the Filipinos, but they won't stay licked, and it looks as though we would have to keep on whipping them over and over again, which is monotonous, expensive and destructive of human life.

The municipal campaign in Chicago, which closed yesterday, has been the most exciting of any witnessed in that city in recent years. Mayor Harrison received the unanimous nomination of the democratic convention, but for some inexplicable, personal reason Governor Altgeld is running as an independent candidate.

The Waterloo Courier says that Rev. Geo. E. Scott, the Methodist minister whose actions are known to all Waterloo people and to the state at large, and who was confined in the Independence asylum on a plea of insanity to escape punishment for his crimes, seems to have outwitted the authorities and is in a fair way to go unwhipped of justice.

The Waterloo Tribune during the last presidential campaign was a supporter of the McKinley-Hanna combination. But the way the combination is running the governmental machine is not quite satisfactory to the Tribune.

No one familiar with the facts expects Mr. McKinley's administration to do anything to wound the feelings of the trust magnates or to block their schemes of further monopoly and restriction of trade.

Eighty of them, organized the trust, are the direct progeny of McKinley-Dingleyism. McKinleyism shuts out foreign competition and renders the trust possible. Do away with the protection system and adopt a tariff for revenue only and you knock the props from under the trusts.

To adopt it, nor his attorney general to make any serious effort to force the law as it stands. There again, the trusts are president McKinley's best friends. Witness the scene at Jekyll's Island last week. McKinley, the guest of Hanna, surrounded by sixty or a hundred trust and railroad presidents and miscellaneous millionaires, banqueting more sumptuously than king, potentate or power.

What of the general industrial effect of this? Every trust in the issue has formed his closest friends and discharged some wage labor, and people have talked of it as a baneful influence on the country.
