Denver Limited Wrecked

Boiler of Locomotive Explodes, Killing Engineer. Victor, Ia., Jan. 20.—As the Denver limited passenger train No. 5 of the Rock Island was passing through this town in the morning at 5:55 the boiler of engine No. 1,190 exploded, resulting in the death of the engineer and a freeman and slightly injuring two porters and a brakeman. The killed are: W. Williams of Brooklyn, Ia., engineer; E. Hoar of Valley Junction, Ia., freeman.

SHAKES PORTION OF STATE

Indiana Business Blocks Swayed by Nitro-Glycerine. Marion, Ind., Jan. 16.—Fifteen hundred quarts of nitro-glycerine stored in two magazines owned by St. Mary's Torpedo company and Empire Glycerine company in a ravine two miles and a half southeast of this city exploded in the morning about 1:30 o'clock, shaking the entire northeastern part of the state. Business blocks and dwelling houses shook and swayed as if rocked by an earthquake and the entire city was aroused.

A yawning hole in the bottom of the ravine was all that was left to tell the story. It is thought that the explosion was caused by a gaslet in one of the magazines which set fire to the building.

FIGHTING ON WATER

SITUATION REVIEWED

General Chaffee Briefly Gives His Ideas of Things in the Philippine Islands.

CANNOT TRUST ALLEGED PACIFISTS

Army Judge Advocate's Opinion—Tagal Amazon Captured—Eleven of Our Soldiers Missing.

Manila, Jan. 20.—General Chaffee, in the annual report which has just been issued, sums up the situation from the military point of view by saying that the provinces of Batangas and Laguna, in the southern Luzon, and the islands of Samar, Mindoro and Cebu constitute the disturbed area in which bodies of insurgents in force are to be found.

General Chaffee says the prolongation of guerrilla warfare is due to the physical character of the country, the nature of the warfare carried on by the insurgents, who in the same hour pose as friends and act as enemies, to the humanity displayed by the United States troops, of which the insurgents take advantage, and to the fear of assassinating the part of those natives who are friendly disposed toward the United States should they give the latter information concerning the movements or whereabouts of the insurgents.

Mixed Government Not an Advantage

Municipal and provincial government have been organized. These governments have not yet received a practical trial. They constitute the only certain and reliable method of securing the progress of the Philippines toward self-government. In the same report Judge Advocate Groesbeck says the suppression of brigandage will probably be one of the most trying problems of the future. LOCOMOTIVE BOILER EXPLODES

Weeks a Fast Train and Kills Two Employees—No Passengers Hurt. Victor, Ia., Jan. 20.—The Denver limited on the Rock Island road was wrecked at this place early Saturday by the explosion of the locomotive boiler as the train was running through town at a good rate of speed. The engine was demolished and every coach was thrown from the track, but, strangely enough, none of the passengers was hurt. Engineer W. Williams, of Brooklyn, Ia., and Fireman J. Hoar of Valley Junction, Ia., were instantly killed, and two porters and a brakeman were slightly injured.

The accident occurred within 250 feet of the station, and the noise of the explosion aroused every person in the town. Pieces of the wrecked engine were strewn around for a distance of 200 feet, and the boiler was found 150 feet away from the scene of the accident. The cause of the explosion will never be known, owing to the death of the engineer and fireman.

PARLIAMENT OPENED

King Edward and Queen Alexandra Occupy Thrones in the House of Peers.

AN IMPOSING STATE PAGEANT

His Majesty Reads the Speech from the Throne—What He Says of the War with the Boers.

London, Jan. 17.—King Edward opened parliament with a ceremonial in all essential respects similar to that of February 1897. The procedure in the house of lords was of the same character as that witnessed on the occasion of the opening of the first parliament of King Edward's reign, while within the upper house were seen the same state pageants, the same historic dresses, and the same revival of ancient form.

King and Queen on Thrones

After rising King Edward and Queen Alexandra entered the house of peers and occupied their thrones, as in a certain order, the prince and princess of Wales on either side of them. The other members of the royal family were seated on chairs at the foot of the steps leading to the throne. The gentleman usher of the house of lords, in the presence of the king, having summoned the speaker and the members of the house of commons, his majesty read the speech from the throne.

TALK OF PEACE NEGOTIATIONS

What May Be an Explanation of Dr. Kuyper's Visit to London. London, Jan. 18.—Hester's Telegram company has received the following dispatch from Amsterdam: "Dr. Kuyper, the Dutch premier, recently intimated to the Boer delegates the desirability, in view of Lord Rosebery's speech at Chesterfield, of their giving some intimation to the British government of the basis upon which they would entertain peace negotiations."

Reference to the War

Contrary to expectations the king's reference to the war in his speech was definite as the statements on the subject made in the last half a dozen messages from the throne. "I regret," said the king, "that the war in South Africa is not yet concluded, though the course of the operations has been favorable to our arms, the British and the Boer forces, and the industries are being resumed in my new colonies. In spite of the tedious character of the campaign, my soldiers and patriots have displayed a heroism and a humanity, even to their own detriment in the treatment of the enemy, which are deserving of the highest praise. The necessity for relieving those troops who have so long and so bravely fought has afforded me the opportunity of again availing myself of the loyal and patriotic offers of my countrymen. Further contingents will shortly reach South Africa from the Dominion of Canada, the Commonwealth of Australia and New Zealand."
