There was recently issued to the postmaster of Chicago the largest amount of stamps and postal cards ever furnished on one order. The requisition called for a total of 17,000,000 stamps of different denominations valued at \$1,032,000 and 15,005,000 postal cards valued at \$150,000.—Ex.

DOCTORS' FEES.

A Medical View of the Charges and Work of Physicians.

The law of supply and demand regulates medical compensation to a very great extent. It is a natural phenomenon, over which neither the professor nor the layman has much control. Where there are many physicians of equal ability competition arises, and the fee is low. If the income drops below living expenses the least successful leave the community or take up other means of getting bread and butter. The fittest survive, and in every locality the position of the profession is in a state of constant flux—never the same from year to year and constantly regulating itself to the work to be done. When a man develops exceptional skill his services are demanded more and more. They are bid up by competitors on the other side. He is, indeed, compelled to raise his fees to prevent overwork, strange as that may seem. He would not be doing his duty if his patients if he tried to treat a hundred a day, and that many would crowd his offices if his fees were 25 cents. It is also a fact that a surgeon can do more now than ever before—a few can do wonders as compared with the surgeons of a century ago—and they receive more in proportion by the operation of natural law. How they gained this ability is immaterial to the question. Indeed, not all have ability to profit by the fortunate opportunities to learn surgery.—American Magazine.

DESPERATE HEROISM.

An Incident of the Indian Fighting Days in Illinois.

With that daring and disregard for pain so often characteristic of border warriors, he immediately whipped out his knife, pushed the blade up, extracted the bullet and held it up, crying: "You're not dead yet, father!"

The old man leaped to his feet, rechecked the wound and bore his full part to the success of the day. No wonder that those days of peril were called upon to defend the frontiers of Illinois.
