The trees along the edge of the grounds have been carefully trimmed, and one or two removed entirely. The out buildings and piles of rock in the rear of the building which have heretofore been so unsightly, have been removed and the site filled in. A broad cement walk has been constructed leading up to the building from the street walk on the south side. As this walk approaches the building leading up to the two entrances, it diverges, leaving thereby directly in front of the building a semi-circular plot of ground which the janitor intends to convert into a beautiful flower garden. These efforts to improve and beautify the city property are certainly commendable.
