MEAT PRODUCERS TO MEET.
The annual meeting of the Central Meat Producers' association of Delaware county will be held at the court house in this city on Saturday afternoon, December 6th, at three o'clock. At this meeting the officers for the coming year will be chosen, also delegates to attend the annual state meeting which will be in session in Des Moines on December 8th and 9th. The officers to be chosen are a president to succeed E. E. McClelland of Ryan, a vice president, and a secretary and treasurer to succeed T. H. Carrothers of Ryan. Secretary H. C. Wallace of the State association writes us that the coming state meeting will be a very important one as the action of the railroads in regard to their failure to comply with the railroad Commerce Commission in ordering a reduction of freight rates on live stock to Chicago will be taken up and thoroughly gone over. The proposed legislation that the association will bring before or to the attention of the coming session of the legislature and other important business will come before this state meeting for discussion and action. A splendid program has been provided. Many prominent men are expected to take part, discussing subjects pertaining to the work of the association, also the feeding and marketing of live stock.

On the same dates the State Agricultural society will hold its annual meeting and coth show at the state house which is an excellent opportunity also has been provided. The Delaware county association should be represented at the state meeting.
