B. Wright. The "Rejuvenation of Aunt Mary" has been starting the past year and is one of the popular productions now entertaining theatre groups. The book is accordingly as interesting. The works of Alice and Phoebe Cary, "As a Chinaman Sees Us" by Gratton, and History of Greek Art by F. B. Tarbell are among the number of volumes which the library offers to its patrons. Then the children have "A Girl of 76" by Amy E. Blanchard, "The Hoosier School Boy" by Edward Eggleston, "Sunbonnet Babies" by Eulalie Grover, "Ratfates" by Kirk Munroe, and "The Merry Adventures of Robin Hood" by Howard Pyle.

The second annual short course in agricultural and domestic science of the Iowa State college will be held at Manchester, February 15 to 20, 1919, under the directorship of Prof. P. G. Holden. The officers of the local association are Henry Brayton of Manchester, president; Frank Brooks of Hopkinton, vice president; Jos. Hutchinson of Manchester, treasurer; and Frank D. Joseph of Manchester, secretary. The department superintendents are T. H. Carothers, Ryan, live stock (horses and beef cattle); L. S. Fisher, Edgewood, live stock (hogs, sheep and dairy cattle); H. E. Robinson, Manchester, agronomy; Chas. Clute and J. E. Frentress, Geo. S. Lialar, Manchester, domestic science. The county representatives are Jos. Hurd of Peosta, Henry George of West Union, and W. B. Warburton of Independence. The value of a short course in agriculture was fully demonstrated to the farmers of this section last winter. The work was very successful from every standpoint. About two hundred farmers attended last year. In addition, more than fifty school boys realized considerable profit from their work at the short course. The second annual meeting will be held on the dates named above. Advanced and beginning classes will be formed, and beginning classes will be formed to accommodate those who are planning more extensive and elaborate courses, which will be more helpful and profitable. The Northwestern Iowa short course district is one peculiar to itself. Diversified farming is marked as in no other district. Arrangements are being made to give each branch of farming industry careful consideration in proportion to its importance. Every farmer in the district should come or send a member of his family to the meeting. The grain contest will be of special interest, as many excellent premiums are to be given away to the best grain raisers in the district, which includes the counties of Mitchell, Howard, Winnebuck, Allamakee, Floyd, Chickasaw, Fayette, Clayton, Butler, Bremer, Black Hawk, Buchanan, Dubuque and Delaware. The expense of attending the short course will be reduced to a minimum. The tuition in the grain and stock judging classes will be \$2.50; in the domestic science classes, \$1.50. This includes admission to all lectures and evening entertainments. The State college at Ames will send the full short course faculty members of which will have charge of all work.

Col. H. A. Allen of Independence was in the city Saturday, and stated during a conversation that the United States government had doubled the appropriation for the Iowa National guard, thereby permitting the military authorities of the state to plan greater and more complete arrangements for coming maneuvers and in purchasing equipment. The additional money was awarded on account of efficiency; that is, the rank of the Iowa state troops has been considerably raised during the past three years. Although the national guard enlists the services of only twenty-six hundred men, yet in marksmanship, military science and efficiency, the statistics show that Iowa is included among her sister states that are able to respond in twenty-four hours to a call for active service. Colonel Allen has been for a number of years a member of the board which endeavors to secure from the legislature certain appropriations for the state guard, and although any amount of securing what the committee considers an adequate amount of money, yet the government's timely assistance, and recognition of the state's efficiency is greatly appreciated by the soldiers of this commonwealth. The resignation of Colonel Dows of Cedar Rapids resulted in the unanimous election of Colonel Allen to the position of Colonel of the 53rd regiment.
