WORK IS WELL UNDER WAY.

Thirty-third General Assembly Completes Half Its Session. OVER 500 BILLS PRESENTED.

School Bills, Public Utility Commission Measure and Movement to Repeal Blanchard Insurance Law Are Important Measures Before Senate.

Des Moines, Feb. 15.—Today the Thirty-third general assembly of the state of Iowa has completed half of its legislative session. While but few completed bills are to be shown as a result of the work of the members for the past six weeks, the session is as far advanced in its work as any of its predecessors have been at this time.

Three Important Measures. The measure of wide importance which are before the legislators can almost be counted on one hand. They embody the school bills, one for the remodeling of the entire school system of the state, which was outlined in this letter last week; another for the creation of a school of correspondence in connection with the state university, and another for the establishment of four new agricultural schools; then there is the public utility commission bill, of vital interest to all cities in the state, and the movement to repeal the Blanchard insurance law, governing fire companies.

Of the measures named the one most likely to meet the approval of the legislature is the anti-Blanchard law bill. Representative Harding of Woodbury county, who is backing the measure, has succeeded in securing the approval of the house committee for his proposed law and declares himself as confident of the final adoption of the bill. In explaining his reasons for introducing the measure, Mr. Harding declared he is simply aiming to make fire insurance rates equal for every insurer in the state, and says it is right that each insurer should pay an equal amount for the same protection then his bill is right and should become the law.

Publicity is one of the best methods of prohibiting unjust rates," says Mr. Harding, "and of making insurance companies as well as other corporations conduct their business in a fair and legitimate way. Under the present law the state auditor, who is the insurance commissioner of the state, and the attorney general have the right to attend all meetings and to have access to all the records of the associations proposed."

days of the session, when the senate refused to recognize a resolution from the house for the appointment of the usual junketing committee to visit the state institutions, there has been an extraordinary amount of control. Yesterday afternoon the senate reconvened after enjoying a recess from Friday afternoon. The recess was one proposed by the senate in a concurrent resolution: it was adopted, but before it was messaged over to the house word reached the senators that it would meet mightly short shrift there. Then a reconsideration was had and the resolution was made to affect the senate alone. The house remained in session during the vacation of the statements of the upper body. Further trouble between the two branches is anticipated when the time for the March recess arrives.

Want Big Appropriations. No one is envying the members of the appropriation committees of the legislature this winter. How to apportion the funds of the state, the state, the board of control, and the clamorers after increased salaries among the officials of the state, especially the district judges of Polk county, who have had a bill introduced to add a nice fat pile of bills to their pay-roll; how to meet the appeals for special appropriations asked for the enforcement of this law or that, which was created by a previous assembly; how to find money for the purchase of additional ground for the use of the state and to beautify the surroundings of the state capitol; these and scores of other matters, some of greater and some of less importance, but all delving down into the capacious pocket-book of State Treasurer Morrow, are things which are tending to make the wise heads of the appropriation committees pass weary days and sleepless nights. The educational institutions, that is the schools at Iowa City, Ames and Cedar Falls, have long ago mastered the problem of dealing with the legislators. They know they will never get all they ask for and have found the easiest way to secure their demands, that is they really expect or need, is to figure the matter down to a fine point and then add a good, round percentage. After the cheese paring by the committees and by the wretchedness of the treasury, on the floor of the house, they know they will be left in the bills as adopted just about the sum they actually wanted, after all this year Chairman Maytag of the senate committee, who for several years has had a hold of the purse strings in that body and who knows how to tie the strings in more unobtainable knots than does anyone else, is almost in despair for fear that his recalcitrancy in knot tying has been solved, and that the purse may be found empty when the last really needed appropriations come to be looked after. The state schools (the university, state college and normal school) are asking for a grand total of appropriations of nearly \$2,000,000. The Ames school wants nearly \$500,000 of this sum, the normal school, always more modest in its asking, will be satisfied with about \$150,000. Besides these sums, there are bills now up for consideration which if adopted, will call for more than a half million good Hawkeye dollars. Many of the matters are under consideration and many of them will get the appropriations asked for, but it goes without question that most of those who are looking for money from the treasury will be a miserably one disappointed.
