

MORGAN'S CONTROL OF THE GREAT WESTERN.

The people of Iowa, and especially of Delaware County, have reason to feel good over the turn of affairs in the reorganization of the Chicago Great Western Ry. In saying this we express no dissatisfaction with the past management of the Great Western. President A. B. The reason for rejoicing over Mr. Morgan's success in securing control of the road, is because the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul and the Illinois Central, are both E. H. Harriman lines, and in these days of railroad mergers it is a good thing to have at least two big railway systems represented in this part of Iowa.

BREAD MADE FROM WHOLE WHEAT.

Two French inventors have recently patented a machine, that can be made small enough for family use, which it is claimed will make good bread without flour. About a pint of water is added to every pound of wheat, and salt and yeast in sufficient quantities. After the grain has soaked about six hours it is ready for the mill. The dough, on issuing from the machine is put into baskets, covered with cloth and allowed to stand in a warm place until it has risen and is ready for the oven.

THE GREAT FLOOD IN MEXICO.

People in this latitude are scarcely able to understand the accounts of floods like the one which drowned 1400 persons and destroyed upwards of \$12,000,000 worth of property, in the vicinity of Monterey, Mexico last Saturday night. The reason why the accounts of such storms seem to us greatly exaggerated is because a rain storm in the north temperate zone and a rainstorm in the torrid zone are very different things. Some idea of the difference can be gleaned from the report that upwards of 18 inches of water fell during the recent storm at Monterey. This is three times larger than one of the greatest storms in this latitude.

THE CHICAGO GREAT WESTERN RE-ORGANIZED.

Last week J. P. Morgan sent his personal check for \$96,000.00 to Secretary of State Haywood, to pay for recording in the state of Iowa the articles of incorporation of the re-organized Chicago Great Western Ry Co. The capital stock of the reorganized company is \$96,000,000. The state of Iowa does not exactly need the money, but can make use of it. For many years in the history of the state articles of incorporation were filed and recorded for about what the labor of recording was worth. A few years ago the system was changed, making the recording fee represent a percentage of the capital stock. The general offices of the Chicago Great Western Railroad company will be removed at once from St. Paul, Minn., to Chicago. The road is out of the hands of the Stickneys completely and entirely. S. M. Felton is to be the new president. He comes from the Clover Leaf syndicate of railroads, at the head of which is Mr. Shonts.

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PRESIDENT DIAZ AIDS SUFFERERS

Contributes \$30,000 to Help Monterey Victims. OTHER AMOUNTS ARE RECEIVED. Total Loss in District Affected by the Cyclone and Flood Will Approximate \$12,000,000 and the Latest Returns Give Number of Dead Between 1,200 and 1,400—American Red Cross to Assist the Unfortunates. Mexico City, Aug. 31.—President Diaz has telegraphed \$30,000 to Monterey. Vice President Corral has contributed \$2,000 and Ambassador Thompson \$1,000 to the fund. Others are contributing liberally, a public subscription list having been opened in all parts of the republic. The fact that the Red Cross of the United States is being aid to the sufferers has been learned here with profound satisfaction. On behalf of the United States government, the American ambassador has sent condolences to President Diaz. The National bank officials estimate the loss in the business center of Monterey at \$5,000,000. The loss to the big smelter and industrial plants outside the city limits will amount to as much. The value of the eighteen blocks of buildings is fixed at about \$3,000,000. The railway losses, although not yet known, are believed to reach \$4,000,000. Many of the smaller settlements in the state have been wholly destroyed or badly damaged, while the crops everywhere have been ruined. It is estimated that the total losses in the whole district affected by the cyclone and floods will approximate \$20,000,000. The latest returns give the number of dead at between 1,200 and 1,400.
