British Patents

According to the report of the comptroller general of patents, patent applications in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland in 1908 numbered 25,598, a decrease of 420 from 1907; of the total, 572 were from women and 1,459 from abroad, the United States furnishing 572 of that total and Germany coming second with 515.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 16.—Forty boys at Birmingham, north of this city, had a stolen locomotive that had been sidetracked by a construction crew and ran the engine several miles.

They then reversed the engine and started for Birmingham, throwing the throttle wide open. The boys were unable to stop the locomotive, which jumped off. All were injured, five seriously.

The engine, which attained a speed of more than a mile a minute, crashed into a freight train in the Birmingham yard and was wrecked.

Washington, Nov. 16.—Thursday, November 25, was officially proclaimed by President Taft as Thanksgiving day. The president's proclamation was issued, as usual, from the state department, where it received the official seal of the United States.

Ninety per cent sulphur is the find made by Capt. Frank Meerwald, a prospector, in the rim of a crater on the top of Mount Makuhina, in the northern islands, according to a report brought by the steamer Homer, arriving from the Pribilof group.

The prospector has staked out his unique claim and he expects to make considerable money out of it. He presented a specimen of the sulphur to Capt. Donaldson of the Homer and also sent a box of the stuff to the Seattle exposition.—San Francisco Chronicle.
