PROMINENT CITIZEN PASSES AWAY

J. M. PEARSE, A RESIDENT OF THIS CITY FOR FORTY-TWO YEARS DIED YESTERDAY.

JUSTICE OF PEACE FOR MANY YEARS

Funeral Will Be Held From The Congregational Church Friday Afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Julian M. Pearse died at his home in this city on Tuesday of this week. The deceased was born in Sudbury, Rutland county, Vermont, on January 20, 1832. In boyhood he moved with his parents to Ohio, and for the past 42 years has been a resident of this city.

The deceased and Nancy D. Coleman were united in marriage at West Union, Iowa, on Dec. 24th, 1855. To this union the following children were born: Mary Alvira, now Mrs. Nelson of Ballinger, Texas; Eva Jane, who died Sept. 15th, 1869; Alice Marion Smith, who died here in Manchester some time ago; James Maitland, of Earlring, Canada; Rufus George, who died Feb. 6th, 1871, and Ella Sapp, of Colfax, Iowa.

Nancy D. Pearse died January 27, 1872. In July 1873 Mr. Pearse was united in marriage with Sarah A. Bishop, who died January 19th, 1892. In March 1899 deceased married Mrs. J. C. Bennett, who survives him.

The deceased was a man of excellent judgment, sterling integrity and admirable disposition. He was a member of the Manchester school



board for 21 years, and for a number of years was its president. At the time of his death, and for 11 or 12 years prior thereto, he was a justice of the peace and city assessor, and he performed the duties of both of these positions to the satisfaction of nearly everyone.

Mr. Pearse was a charter member of Manchester Lodge No. 149, I. O. O. F., and held many positions of honor and trust in that order, as well as in the Masonic orders of this city. He was a 32d degree Consistory Mason.

Mr. Pearse died a useful life, and few men have enjoyed the confidence and respect of their acquaintances in as high a degree as he did.

The funeral will be held at the Congregational church next Friday afternoon at 2 p. m. Rev. J. F. Moore will preach the funeral sermon.

The funeral will be under the auspices of Manchester Lodge No. 165, A. F. and A. M.
