CAPTURE YOUNG WOLVES.

Last Friday, Robert Nietert, the son of Charles Nietert, who resides about two and one-half miles south of Hopkinton, captured eight young wolves near a place called Table Rock, on the west bank of the Maquoketa River in South Fork Township. Mr. Nietert was hunting woodchucks with his dog, which is half hound and half shepherd, when they came upon a wolf which ran at their approach. The dog soon located the wolf's den where the eight wolves were found. They are of the species known as gray or timber wolf, and under ordinary conditions a full grown gray wolf is more than a match for any dog. Last February, Mr. Nietert killed an old gray wolf about forty rods from where he found these young ones. The young wolves were all removed alive from the den, and brought to Manchester the next day where they were placed on exhibition in one of the show windows of the Snodgrass Clothing store. There is a \$2.00 bounty paid for each wolf killed, and it is more than probable that sooner or later these young wolves will lose their scalps.
