GEDNEY HOTEL CHANGES OWNERSHIP

Sale Includes Entire Plant. There Will be no Change in Management.

The deal for the sale of the Gedney hotel property, which has been on tap for several weeks, was closed yesterday, when Joseph P. Moore, of Sandwich, Ill., who owned the institution since last February, transferred the property to C. Becker, a wealthy banker of St. Louis, whose wealth is rated at at least \$250,000. The transfer includes the entire plant, hotel, opera house, power establishment and everything else connected with the establishment. There will be no change in the management. Landlord and Mrs. H. J. Wilson, who have been in charge of the hotel since Mr. Moore took possession of it, will continue to lease and operate the establishment with the signal efficiency that has marked their regime. Their son, Clyde H. Wilson, will continue to manage the opera house. W. R. Gill will remain in the employ of the Manager Wilson as engineer. By the terms of the transfer, Mr. Becker became the owner on July 1st. It is the intention of the new owner to equip the power plant in first class shape and furnish commercial heating for all who may desire it, placing that department in the best of condition and on a good paying basis.—Independence Bulletin Journal.
