JOE MCCORMICK IN ACCIDENT

New Cases for October Term of Court. Methodist Quarterly Conference Held.

The Delaware county fair opens today (Tuesday) and closes on Friday. The fair management has provided a goodly list of attractions in the way of baseball, races, free features and exhibits. The grounds have been put in excellent condition and the ball ground and race track are being put in good shape.

The stock exhibit is to be one of the largest in the history of the association, as a large percentage of the stalls have been engaged. The Art Hall has been put in fine condition and some very interesting exhibits may be seen there. A complete program has been offered to entertain the people during the week.

The base ball schedule for the week is as follows: Wednesday, a game will probably be played between two of the school districts of the county; Thursday, two games, Arlington vs. Manchester and Greeley vs. Dyersville; and on Friday Ryan vs. Manchester.

The Manchester band will furnish the music during the week. One of the features of the attractions will be the daily balloon ascension made by Hergetz Bros. The Cretos will also entertain the people with their acrobatic performances.

Prof. Bowman of Ames will be present and judge the oaks grown by Delaware county boys from seed furnished by the Galloway Company of Waterloo, and he will also deliver lectures on the subject.

A number of special premiums have been offered by several of the business men of Manchester together with the cash prizes offered by the association.

One year membership tickets are for sale at the Delaware County State bank, admitting a man, wife and team during the entire fair for \$1.50.

An excursion will be run on Thursday over the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul and M. & O. leaving Arlington at 8:22 a. m. and arriving at Manchester at 10:50 a. m. Returning the special train will leave Manchester at 6:30 p. m.

HAD NARROW ESCAPE.

Joe McCormick, who recently fell toward Cedar Rapids to accept the position of city editor of the Gazette narrowly escaped serious injury last Saturday evening. While crossing a bridge on his bicycle he was struck by an automobile and thrown against a passing street car. He fell to the ground and the automobile ran over him. His injuries were not serious. The Gazette gave the following account of the accident:

Joe McCormick, city editor of The Gazette, had a narrow escape from death about one o'clock today. He was coming across First avenue bridge, when an auto driven by G. W. Fradog of Bennett, and coming up from behind, struck the hind wheel of his bicycle, throwing him against a west-bound street car. The moving car threw McCormick under the auto. The machine was stopped and "Mac" was helped out from under the auto. One front wheel of which had passed over him. He was badly bruised about the hip, but fortunately no bones were broken. His wheel was badly demoralized. Mr. Fradog gave his name and later called at The Gazette office and offered to pay whatever damages had resulted.

BASE BALL TALK.

Anamosa Wins Championship—Loss to Strawberry Point last Friday.—Fat Men's Ball Team in Trouble.

Anamosa won the championship series with Monticello at Cedar Rapids last week. It took three games to decide it and the winners got a purse of \$500.00 together with 60 percent of the gate receipts. Monticello won the first game on Tuesday of last week by a score of 2 to 1. Dye of Strawberry Point pitched for Monticello and proved invincible with his terrific speed and excellent control. "Fuzzy" Blyler was in the box for Anamosa.

Anamosa won the second game on Wednesday by a score of 2 to 1. The third game was won by Anamosa on Thursday by a score of 4 to 2. Monticello threw for Monticello and Blyler for Anamosa. The former had the best of the battle, but errors at bat times spoiled his team's chances of winning. The game had a great climax in the ninth inning, with two men on bases Monaghan hit a line drive to right field. Allen after a great run made a one handed catch making a double play. Monticello al ready had made one score in the ninth and with these two runs would have been placed in the lead. The rivalry between the two teams was intense, and the games, the third in particular, were exciting. The old score of twenty-one years ago is reversed and Anamosa takes back the purse of \$500.

Anamosa came out victorious in a hard series of games with Monticello last week only to go down to defeat before the Strawberry Point aggregation on Friday. The game was played at Strawberry Point. Dye pitched for the home team, and Allen for the visitors. Jacoby will probably pitch for the Manchester team. Anamosa got the worst of a decision which cost them a score. Dye touched a runner at home plate, but dropped the ball. A cloud of dust prevented the umpire from seeing the play distinctly, and the player was called out. Allen was hit for two long drives in the tenth bringing in a run and ending the game by a score of 3 to 2.

Roy Crabb who left the Manchester team for a position with the Davenport Three I League team is making good. He pitched last Thursday for Davenport in a game with Bloomington, which resulted in a score of 11 to 0 in favor of Davenport. Bloomington obtained only three hits off Crabb. Crabb made one run and two hits, one of which was a three bagger. Crabb pitched Sunday for Davenport in a game with Peoria, Davenport winning by a score of 2 to 1.

Members of Frank Kne's latest ball team on earth have brought suit in the district court of Blackhawk county, demanding their salary money. The petition was filed last Saturday. They claim to have contracted to Frank Kne and J. E.
