

Iowa News Briefs

Lyons will have a democratic rally October 14th.

The Iowa corn crop is estimated at 500,000,000 bushels.

Attorney James P. Starr is now mayor of Fairfield.

John O'Leary, 42, is dead of heart trouble at Villisca.

Miss Fickie threatened to jump in front of a Des Moines street car and kill himself and was arrested.

Veterans of the Seventeenth Iowa Volunteer Infantry will meet in Des Moines on Oct. 12 and 13 for their annual reunion.

Treasurer State bank, capital stock \$600,000, has had its incorporation papers amended extending the life of the bank twenty years.

J. H. Kerwin & Sons has been incorporated at Oelwein, capital stock \$200,000, by J. H. Kerwin, W. P. Kerwin and L. T. Kerwin.

While trying to set fire to a magazine of loaded cartridges, Pay Boos, 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Boos, Des Moines, was seriously injured when the missiles exploded.

George Clark has received a commission as Newton postmaster to succeed M. A. McCord, who has held the office over twelve years. Mr. Clark assumed the office on Monday.

Harvey Dean, former Des Moines alderman, reported to the police that a fine Percheron mare had been stolen from the stable at his home, half a mile east of the state fair grounds.

Capt. Guy Brewer of the state land office has in his possession one of the very few numbers of the old "Iowa Political Manual" issued by Editor Terrill of the Iowa City Republican in 1851.

A notable assemblage of eminent railway men will meet in Des Moines Oct. 22, when the Central and Western Association of Car Service Officers will hold their semi-annual convention.

Another climax in the exciting feud, growing out of the railroad bond tax controversy, occurred when County Attorney Goodspeed, at Atlanta, attacked William Prall, the well known capitalist.

Judge Hugh Brennan of the law division of the district court has declared the Iowa law unconstitutional permitting peace officers and officers of the Humane society to shoot lame and decrepit animals.

Dr. E. O. Aylesworth, former dean of Drake university and later president of the state agricultural college of Colorado, will be the attraction at the state suffrage convention to be held at Corydon on November 15.

Davenport's movement for a commission form of government struck an unexpected snag when Mayor Alfred C. Mueller refused to ask a special election on the ground that the petition does not comply with the law.

As Frank Johnson, Des Moines asphalting inspector, jumped into a steam roller the wind blew his coat into a cogwheel of the machinery. He was drawn into the mechanism until his right arm and shoulder were crushed.

Iowa Daughters of the Revolution are planning, on going before the state legislature this winter to ask more stringent laws relative to the use of the American flag in the state. They wish to prevent its use on cigar boxes.

Satisfied with the ruling of Judge De Graff, which ordered him to return \$300 of a \$400 fee, W. T. Maxey, a Des Moines attorney, announced his intention of taking his troubles to the supreme court of the state. His notice of appeal was filed in the district court.

Eugene Ely, the aviator in the Curtiss biplane, which tumbled to the ground in Chicago, smashing one of the wings of the machine, is an Iowa City lad and well known. Mr. Ely entered the Chicago to New York flight but did not make a great distance on the first attempt.

C. C. Stout, a Western Union line man, who was fatally injured at Salem, Ia., was taken to Keokuk on a special train and died in Graham hospital. He was buckled to a tall telegraph pole, when the rotten pole snapped off near the ground and he fell a distance of thirty-five feet.
