FEARS FOOD FAMINE
VAST RAILROAD STRIKE IN FRANCE IS PARALYZING BUSINESS EVERYWHERE.
WAR MEASURES ARE ADOPTED
Labor Leaders Boast They Will Make Tie-Up Complete — Telegraph Wires Are Cut—Paris Garrison Is Reinforced.
Paris.—The railroad strike has completely tied up the Northern, Eastern, Western, State and Paris, Lyons and Mediterranean lines, and the situation has assumed a most serious aspect. The leaders of nearly every class of workmen are threatening to call a general industrial strike that will paralyze business in every section of the country.
The electricians and the employees of the omnibus, metropolitan and subway transportation lines of this city Wednesday considered the advisability of seizing this opportunity to launch a strike for the redress of long-standing grievances. The situation throughout the republic is regarded as grave.
The railway companies are making a desperate struggle to maintain service with the aid of military engineers and men from the navy, but are meeting with little success.
The president of the grain syndicate said that the stock of flour on the Paris market did not exceed 75,000 quintals, which is less than eight days' supply for Paris.
This does not include the flour in bakers' hands, which, however, is not large. The bulk of meats, vegetables and fruits come in over the Western and Paris, Lyons and Mediterranean lines.
The National Railroad union, comprising only 100,000 of the total of 300,000 men employed in the railway service, but a large majority of the nonunion men are participating in the strike.
The government is adopting measures similar to those practiced in time of war.
The calling of 30,000 of the strikers for army reserve duty is not likely to have any immediate effect on the situation, as the military code allows a man a delay of 15 days before responding to the call.
The strikers leaders boast that soon the tie-up will be complete throughout the country. Premier Briand has issued a public statement in which he denounced the strike as an insurrection, purely, built up on criminal foundations.
The garrison of Paris has been reinforced by troops from the provinces and all the principal points along the railroads effected by the strike are guarded.
Many telegraph wires were cut including several connecting France with London and Brussels. President Fallieres hurriedly returned from his estate in the south and conferred with the ministers. The problem of food looms ominously. Already the market is pinched. Enormous quantities of milk and fish en route from Normandy and Belgium are stalled at points along the Northern road.

COURT HAS A BIG DOCKET
SUPREME TRIBUNAL ENTERS UPON IMPORTANT TERM.
Tobacco Trust, Standard Oil Corporation Tax, and Other Cases of Great Significance.
Washington.—Owing to the illness and deaths of the members of the United States supreme court during the past two years the argument list, when it reassembled Monday, found the docket piled high with important cases which presaged a busy and important session.
Although the tobacco trust, Standard Oil, railroad and the corporation tax cases at regarded as the most important ones now before the Supreme bench, there are a number of other cases of considerable national significance. One of the latter is the original act of the state of Virginia against its next-door neighbor, West Virginia, in which several million dollars are involved as a result of the division of Virginia in its original state. The suit consists of an attempt to compel West Virginia to shoulder part of the debt that existed in Virginia at the time of the division.
There are two pension cases appealed by the state of Florida; the appeal of a number of railroads in the western territory in the suit brought by them against the railroad commission of Missouri; three original cases brought by the United States on account of alleged violations of the pure food and drug act; the appeal of the United States from the United States circuit court for eastern Missouri in a suit against the Western Terminal association of St. Louis, which is known as the Eads bridge monopoly case; and the libel suit of the United States against the Press Publishing company of New York which grew out of articles printed in the New York World about two years ago, which was then president; William Nelson Cromwell and others in connection with the sale of the Panama canal. The docket contains also a corresponding case against the Indianapolis tobacco trust and Standard Oil cases are to be reargued and the clerk of the court has placed them on the docket for November without any definite date. In each of these cases the largest sum assumed the role of "trust buster," because of its attempt to dissolve what is deemed a trust operating in violation of the Sherman anti-trust act.

BOUNTIFUL CROP OF GRAIN
Total Is Swelled by Bumper Yield of Corn and Wheat Also Plentiful.
Washington.—Official figures issued by the crop reporting board of the department of agriculture show that corn has come out a bumper crop, the former having three billion bushels and the latter exceeding last year's billion-bushel crop by nearly 100,000,000 bushels. Even the wheat crop turns out to be only 45,000,000 bushels behind the big yield of 1909 and already the market is pinched. Governor Sanders of New Orleans and Party Are Entertained by Press Club.
Chicago.—Chicago has been entertaining a lively party of boomers from New Orleans, who are urging the Crescent City's claims to the exposition that is to celebrate the completion of the Panama Canal in 1915. In the party were Governor Sanders, Mayor Behrman of New Orleans, C. H. Ellis, president of the New Orleans Board of Trade, M. B. Truett, secretary of the New Orleans Progressive Union, and J. L. Wright, secretary of the World's Panama Exposition company. Immediately after their arrival Monday they were entertained at luncheon by the Press club, John C. Shaffer, retiring president of the club, presiding. In the evening they were the guests of the Southern club at dinner at the Congress hotel. Tuesday Governor Sanders addressed the National Grain Dealers' association, in convention here, and Mr. Ellis addressed the Board of Trade. The party was given a luncheon by the Cook County Real Estate board.

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Its Geographical Position and Many Other Considerations Mark It as Most Suitable Spot for Dedication of Great Work.
Public sentiment has decided that the completion of the Panama Canal in 1915 shall be celebrated with a great international exposition in which all the nations of the world may participate; and the question of where this Exposition is to be held will be settled by Congress at its approaching session.
New Orleans and San Francisco are contending for the honor of holding this Exposition, and both cities have guaranteed immense sums of money as an evidence of their ability to finance to great an enterprise.
An Exposition worthy of the term "World's Fair," such as New Orleans proposes to build, will be a great educational movement. Its success as such, however, will depend entirely on the percentage of our population who can secure its educational advantages, this in turn, depends upon its location, as the time in traveling to and from the Exposition, and the cost in railroad and Pullman fares, are the most important factors. Considering these matters, New Orleans' claims to being the "Logical Point" for this Panama Exposition, seem to be fully substantiated by the following facts:
New Orleans is 500 miles from the center of population in the United States. San Francisco is 2,500 miles distant therefrom.
Within a radius of 500 miles from New Orleans there are 17,000,000 people. Within the same radius from San Francisco there are only 2,000,000. Within a radius of 1,000 miles from New Orleans, there are 65,000,000. Within the same radius from San Francisco there are only 6,000,000.
At an average of 900 miles from New Orleans, there are 70 of our principal cities with a combined population of 20,000,000. Averaging 900 miles from San Francisco there are only 12 large cities, with a combined population of just 1,000,000. The average distance of all these cities to New Orleans is 792 miles, to San Francisco 2,407 miles.
Over 75 per cent of the people of the United States could go to an Exposition there at an average expense for railroad fare of \$12.50, as against an average of \$37.50 to the Pacific Coast; and for several millions of our people, the Pullman fare and Dining Car expenses alone, for a trip to San Francisco, would amount to more than all their transportation expenses for a trip to New Orleans.
This is an important public question to be settled by Congress at a session which convenes in December. 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SMASH 3 WORLD'S RECORDS
The Harvester, Alleen Wilson and Joan Trot Sensational Races at Lexington Track.
Lexington, Ky.—Three world's records were smashed at the Kentucky Trotting Horse Breeders' association fall meeting here Thursday. The Harvester, driven by the veteran reinsman Ed. Geary, lowered the world's two-mile record held by Crepusculum from 4:17 to 4:15 1/4, trotting the last quarter in the sensational time of 31 1/4 seconds.
Alleen Wilson, 2:02 1/4, a black mare by Arrow Wood owned by John P. Conkey, Boston, set a new record for pacing mares, with a new record for the distance in 2:04 1/4. In the Walnut Hall farm cup race, the four-year-old bay mare Joan, by Directum Spler, trotted the first heat in 2:05 1/4, setting a new record for the race, and the third heat of the same event she trotted the mile in 2:04 3/4, making a world's record for a four-year-old of any sex.

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
