CRUSHED ROCK FOR ROADS.
The state will sell crushed rock for road work at cost. The rubble-stone which the state owns at the state reformatory at Anamosa, the refuse of the vast quarries which have long been worked by convict labor, is being crushed into material suitable for macadam or for use in concrete base for roads. Recently the state board of control installed a rock crusher and commenced to crush rock. It will be sold to counties that can make use of the same for road work for the cost of production, which is merely nominal. The purchaser will have to pay the railroad fare on the same. It is the best possible material for road work and the board of control will be pleased to have counties or cities of townships arrange to use the state crushed rock.—Dyersville Commercial.
