EULOGISTIC INSTRUCTIONS FOR NEW JERSEY GOVERNOR UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED.

MEETING HARMONIOUS AND HOPEFUL

Delegates Chosen to Attend State Convention at Burlington May 16th.

Pursuant to the published call the democrats of Delaware county held a delegate convention in the Court House in this city last Saturday. Hubert Carr, the county chairman, called the meeting to order a few minutes after eleven a. m., the hour fixed in the call for the commencement of the convention. E. B. Porter of Delhi was selected as temporary secretary. A committee on credentials consisting of James Burton, Henry Bronson and J. F. McElmeel was elected and a recess taken until one p. m.

Shortly after the opening of the afternoon session the credentials committee made the following report:

We, the committee on credentials, find the delegates whose credentials are hereto attached entitled to seats in this convention and also recommend that the delegate or delegates present have power to cast the full vote of his or their township.

On motion of James Burton the report of the committee on credentials was unanimously adopted.

Thomas Noonan was then chosen permanent chairman and E. B. Porter, permanent secretary.

On motion duly carried the chairman was empowered and directed to appoint a committee of three on resolutions, and the chair selected as such committee, W. F. Drummy, W. F. Croskey and E. M. Carr.

The chair was also empowered and directed, by motion duly carried, to appoint a committee of three to represent the county in the Democratic state convention to be held in Burlington on the 16th day of next May.

Both committees retired for consultation and to prepare their reports. The committee on delegates made the following report, which on motion was accepted, approved and adopted:

We the committee to select delegates to attend the state convention at Burlington to be held on the 16th day of May do select the following to represent Delaware county:

E. M. Carr, J. J. Goen, John W. Hartman, J. S. McConnell, Elias Faust, Gene Coakley, J. F. McElmeel, Will Pelley.

We, the committee, say that the delegates present at said convention be empowered to cast the full vote of the county.

The committee on resolutions then reported the following resolutions for the consideration of the convention: Be It Resolved:

That the democrats of Delaware county, in the delegate convention assembled, rejoice because there are within their party ranks so many eminently qualified statesmen, who are aspiring for the presidency of this great nation; and especially re-

joice because one of the aspirants is so preeminently qualified for the presidential office, and that one is Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey. He, above all others, is specially qualified to deal with the supreme contest now being waged between privileged business and human rights. As a ripe scholar and student of world politics he will, if given an opportunity, remove the malignant combinations which now afflict the country's economic system without injury to anything that is legitimate or honest. He will do this work much the same as does the skilled surgeon, who removes the malignant ulcer with the least possible injury to the healthy tissue. And Be It Further Resolved:

That present day conditions call imperatively for just such a leader as Woodrow Wilson. He has refused to permit any privileged interest to place him under obligations, thus leaving him free to act for the people and all of the people. We want him for our standard bearer, and hereby instruct the delegates selected to represent Delaware county in the Democratic state convention to be held at Burlington, Iowa, on May 16th, 1912, and in any district caucus or convention for the nomination or election of national delegates, to do everything which they can honorably do to secure a Wilson delegation from Annals of Iowa.

Committee on resolutions.

E. M. Carr moved that the resolutions as reported by the committee, be adopted by the convention and stated reasons why he believed that his motion should prevail.

E. B. Porter moved to amend the resolutions by substituting the name of Champ Clark for that of Wilson. He said that there were some Clark men among the delegates, who would like to be counted for Clark, and that if they were outnumbered on the vote, as they expected to be, they would consent to a unanimous vote in favor of the Wilson resolutions.

Mr. Porter's amendment was seconded and a roll call resulted in 61 votes for Wilson and 6 for Clark. The Delhi delegation was the only one that voted for Clark. The amendment having been defeated, the original motion for the adoption of the resolutions as reported by the committee was put to a vote and carried unanimously. The convention then adjourned.

J. P. DODGE.

J. P. Dodge was born in Franklin county, Massachusetts, April 26th, 1832, and died at his home on West Union street, Wednesday, March 6, 1912. At the age of twenty two years he removed to Rockford, Illinois, and remained there ten years, coming to Manchester in 1864, and settling on a farm in Prairie township, where he lived until 1893. He then sold his farm and moved to Manchester. He was united in marriage with Sarah Ann Lawrence, July 15, 1862, at Rockford, Illinois, who died in this city June 13, 1911. Mr. Dodge is survived by two daughters: Mrs. S. E. Turner of Doland, South Dakota, and Mrs. G. S. Williams, who has resided with her father since the death of her mother a few months ago. He is also survived by one brother, John A. Dodge of Waterloo. These together with Mr. Turner and a niece from Waterloo were here to attend the funeral services which were held from the residence on Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. J. F. The deceased was a thoroughly upright man, who enjoyed a reputation for the highest integrity and whose character was above reproach. In the death of J. P. Dodge the community has lost a good man and an excellent citizen.
