

2. Material, Re-inforced concrete and steel.
3. Width of roadway, Sixteen feet. Depth of fill, Eight feet.
4. Length of Span, Eight feet.
5. Drainage Area, One thousand acres.
6. Estimate Cost, Five hundred dollars.




