

ENGINEER SPARE IS KILLED IN WRECK

FORMER DELAWARE COUNTY BOY LOSES LIFE IN RAILROAD WRECK AT OLDS, IOWA.

PIONEERS PASS AWAY DURING WRECK

Thomas Dunlap of Hopkinton and C. S. Harvey of Delaware Answer Summons.

Mrs. Edward Putnam of this city received the sad intelligence on Sunday that her half brother, George A. Spare, had been instantly killed in a railroad wreck near Olds, Iowa, while he was at his post of duty as engineer on the Minneapolis & St. Louis railway.

George Arthur Spare was born in Jo Davis county, Illinois, March 1871, and lived with his parents near Apple River, Illinois, until his mother died in 1874. He then lived with his grandparents and Mrs. J. C. Spare in Galena, Illinois, until 1878, when he went to live with his father, Arthur Spare, near Colerburg, Iowa.

Mr. Spare made his headquarters at Oklaheola, Iowa, where he was widely known as a member of the Oklaheola, Earl and was a highly respected member of that organization.

Mr. Spare leaves to mourn his death his father, Arthur Spare, who resides in Oklaheola, Iowa, and a brother, J. E. Spare, of Hunter, North Dakota, and the following half-brothers and half-sisters: Mrs. Edward Putnam of Chicago, Mrs. Eugene Snowden of Mrs. Ernest Snowden, near Pasadena, Florida; Mrs. James Daffin of Moline, Florida; and David Spare, who resides in a farm near Green township, where he resides with his father at Cantonment, Florida.

The relatives are extended the sincere sympathy of the kind friends of this great sorrow that has come to their homes.

THOMAS B. DUNLAP, father of County Recorder A. E. Dunlap, died at his home in Hopkinton on Monday, March 23rd, 1914, following a brief illness. Funeral services are being held this morning at the Congregational church, and interment made in the cemetery near that church.

GRAND JURY SUBMITS ITS REPORT

NO ACTION IN GREELY CASE

Petition for Continuance in Greely Case Presented to the Court.

Judge Charles W. Mullan opened court on Monday morning, when the case of the State of Iowa vs. Ernest Dunkel came up for trial. Dunkel was indicted by the grand jury on a charge of assault with intent to do bodily injury. At the time this paper goes to press the jury is out on the case.

Up to three o'clock this afternoon Judge Mullan had not rendered his opinion with regard to the application for a continuance in the case of the State of Iowa vs. Marshall Hansel.

The grand jury which was sworn in at the opening of the March term of court, completed its work on Monday morning of this week, and Judge Charles W. Mullan convened court. A goodly amount of business was transacted by the grand jury here this week.

John D. Schaffer, one of the older residents of Manchester, passed away at his home in this city Tuesday morning following an illness of nearly a year. During the time Mr. Schaffer was afflicted with sciatic rheumatism, and took treatments at different noted sanitariums in an effort to get relief.
