Proposal blanks will be furnished by the city clerk, to be used in making bids for construction of said improvement. Certified checks accompanying bids will be returned to the successful bidder and also to the bidder to whom the contract is awarded, when he shall have entered into contract in form prescribed by the city council and given bond in the sum of Five Hundred dollars, with sureties to be approved by the said city council, for the faithful performance of said contract. In case the successful bidder shall fail to enter into said contract or furnish bond as required by law, said check shall be forfeited to the city of Manchester, Iowa, as agreed and liquidated damages.

The contract shall contain a provision that the contractor shall guarantee the improvement to remain in good repair for the term of one year, from and after the date of its acceptance by the city.
