MRS. CHARLES TRIPP DIES AT CLINTON

DEATH OCCURS ON MONDAY AFTERNOON AT HOME OF HER SON.

LAURA V. MCKAY ANSWERS SUMMONS

Funeral Services Will Be Held Saturday Afternoon from Methodist Church.

MRS. CHARLES TRIPP.

Manchester friends will regret to learn of the death of Mrs. Charles Tripp at the home of her son, Eugene Tripp, at Clinton, Iowa, Monday evening, November 23, 1914, after a brief illness.

Mrs. Tripp formerly resided in the northeast part of this city and went to Texas about two years ago, where she resided for some time. She removed to Clinton in July, 1914, to make her home with her son. Mrs. Tripp's husband preceded her in death about twelve years ago. Deceased is survived by five sons, William, of McGregor, Iowa; Ira, of Mason City, Iowa; Robert, of Texas; Ernest, of Minnesota, and Eugene, of Clinton, and two daughters, Bertha and Nellie.

FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE.

In an interview with Dr. J. W. Scott of this city this morning he stated that so far as is known there are no cases of the foot and mouth disease in Delaware county. He also stated that he communicated with Dr. J. L. Gibson, state veterinarian, of Des Moines, by telephone, and was informed that there was not one case of the disease in Dubuque county as had been reported but that one herd of cattle that had been shipped there from the east to a farm east of Dyersville and was under quarantine simply because the shipment came from a section where the disease is prevalent.
