LARGEST FINANCIAL GOAL EVER PROPOSED FOR VOLUNTEER GIVING
Based on a Scientific Survey of the Urgent Needs of the World

Thirty denominations will hold a United Simultaneous Financial Campaign throughout the United States from April 25 to May 2, for funds to carry on the world-wide task of the church.
The total financial objective will be \$336,777,573. Of this amount \$176,448,300 is to be paid in 1920.
Iowa has been asked to raise a quota of \$27,505,238.23 as its part of this large fund.
Every one of the thirty cooperating denominations will work not only for its own denominational quota but the interchurch quota as well.
This is the largest financial goal ever proposed for volunteer giving, being more than twice that of the United War Work campaign.
It is the first objective in which the element of conjecture is absent, for it is based on a scientific survey of the needs of the world.

They should be fed sunflower seed, hemp seed, boiled, yellow corn, stale bread soaked in water, an occasional piece of apple or banana, roasted peanuts, dry crackers. Plenty of water and gravel should be kept in the cage. The parrot's cage should be cleaned every day.
