

As a result of the recent cold snap fruit and small grain has been damaged to an extent of thousands of dollars. The storm extended over the entire state.

Two women are on the jury which is hearing the evidence in the case of Charles F. Christiansen a Sioux City man charged with the killing of his wife on Jan. 15, this year.

Raymond Pell, an Iowa City electrician, was painfully burned, when 300 volts coursed through his body as he crossed his hands over two live wires while working with a 30 H. P. motor.

Miss Mary E. Hall, 65 years old, enroute from Washington, Ind., to Russell, Iowa, while waiting between trains, dropped dead in Burlington union station. Heart trouble is assigned as the cause of her death.

Fulton F. Potter of Mason City, who has been a state bank examiner for the past two years with headquarters, has been given a commission by the comptroller of currency as national bank examiner.

Guy Kinsley, who is believed to have begun farming in Clayton county earlier than any other person now living, died at McGregor recently at the age of 96 years. He came to Iowa from his Vermont home to take up land in 1853.

E. E. Tam, of Des Moines has accepted the position of assistant internal revenue collector for Iowa. He was offered the position in a telegram from Congressman C. C. Dowell. He will be located in the federal building, Des Moines.

One of the most successful Percheron sales to be staged in the country this season was the sale of James Looan & Son, at the Cedar Falls fair ground recently. Forty-one mares were sold. Thirty-one of the animals averaged \$522, and ten of them averaged \$466. The top price was \$906 for a 2-year-old mare sold to W. M. Metcalf, Glen Haven, Wis. Frazier of Humboldt secured two teams at an average price of \$656.

Thirty residents of Cloverhill, Ia., filed a petition in District court recently asking that a portion of the town in which they reside be withdrawn and a new town formed. They claim that the portion to be withdrawn will not be under any obligation to pay up any of the town's indebtedness upon withdrawal, for the reason that the town is free from debt. C. H. Ashworth and J. G. Ashworth are among the petitioners.

Dick Smith of Dunlap, Iowa, was shot and probably fatally wounded by Marshall Bonar at Dunlap, after the marshal had rescued Smith and T. Whaley from underneath an overturned automobile. Unable to lift the car himself, Bonar said he summoned help, but after the rescue was effected Smith became abusive because the marshal was so slow, and knocked the latter down. Bonar said he shot Smith to protect himself. Smith is in a hospital.

Government property on the state tract at Camp Dodge consisting of 670 acres bought for a national guard permanent encampment together with the \$400,000 water plant, probably will become valueless after July 1 unless negotiations are completed for sale of property to the state. Negotiations have been pending for purchase of the water plant, hundreds of barracks and out-buildings and other property used in the army encampment, for \$34,800. The original cost is said to have been over \$2,000,000.

An order has been received at federal headquarters from Washington, directing that L. W. Boehner of Malvern, Iowa, to report for transportation to federal prison at Fort Leavenworth, to begin serving a three-year term on conviction of obstructing the draft and for slandering the Red Cross Boehner, who is a wealthy man, was convicted more than a year ago. He appealed his case, was denied a re-hearing and since, it has been understood, had taken his case to President Harding, asking for a pardon.

Des Moines bandits killed night Marshal J. K. Meyers at Stuart recently and robbed the First National bank there of \$800. Marshal Meyers surprised them at work in the bank and they ran, shooting at him. They wounded him three times, twice in the thigh and once near the heart. He died shortly after the shooting at the Stuart hospital. The murderers were chased by posses at Dexter, Waukeo and Van Meter, along the road, but could not be overtaken. The crimes were perpetrated about 8 a. m. Meyers was found lying in a pool of blood in front of the bank. A pistol with all the shells discharged lay at his side.

Announcement has been made of the appointment of Miss Rosetta Graves to head the women's department in the state federal employment office at the county courthouse. She assumed her new duties at once.

Fred Coleman, Negro, of Buxton, Iowa, was held to the grand jury on two charges. One was manslaughter, the other perjury. Coleman several weeks ago collided with an automobile driven by L. E. Smith in Des Moines. Smith's machine was hurled on the sidewalk, striking Mrs. Mary Hobson, 74 years old, which resulted in her death.

FATALITIES ON IOWA HIGHWAYS

The Iowa State Highway Commission Bulletin has compiled statistics showing fatalities and accidents on the state's highways during the month of January. According to the figures sixteen persons were killed, some losing their lives in automobile accidents, some while attempting to cross railway tracks, and only one out of the sixteen was killed as a result of being thrown from a horse. There were also a total of 114 accidents on the highways, with a total of 107 persons injured.

Considering the number of cars that are being driven on the highways and the careless manner in which many of these cars are handled, the wonder is that the number of fatalities is not much larger. Nothing short of a kind Providence keeps many from meeting with disastrous results.

ORDINANCE NO. 250.

An ordinance repealing ordinance No. 244 of the city of Manchester, Iowa, relative to the cheating of the office of city manager for the city of Manchester, Iowa: Providing the duties and powers of such office and fixing the salary and enacting in lieu thereof the following: Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Manchester, Iowa:

Section 1. That there be and hereby is created the office of City Manager for the City of Manchester, Iowa. Section 2. The City Manager shall be appointed by the majority vote of the City Council at a regular meeting of such body who shall, before entering on the discharge of his duties, give a bond in the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2000.00) conditioned on the faithful performance of his duties. Such manager shall hold office during the pleasure of such body and shall be subject to removal by a majority vote thereof.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the City Manager to perform all duties provided by ordinance of the City Clerk, Superintendent of water works and City Engineer and such other duties as from time to time may be imposed upon him and shall receive as compensation for such service the sum of \$150.00 per month, payable monthly. Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after it is passed, approved and published as by law provided. Passed and approved this 11th day of April, 1921.
