Mr. Shay, of Streator, at once obtained the floor and opposed the measure, saying that as a matter of policy it would be better to force the old parties to take up the principles and also that each particular locality of prohibitionists should be allowed to regulate this matter to suit themselves. Jacob Bane, of Ottawa, favored the resolution and was in for prohibition paddling its own canoe, from this time henceforth and forever. He had cut loose from all old ties, severed his connections and started on a "march through Georgia" again. Matlock and Campbell, of Ottawa, were of the same opinion; so was Dr. Glover, of LaSalle. Esquire Burwell, of Seneca, hated to tear himself away from the republicans, and hoped for this reformation. He didn't like the resolution. For two hours or more this sort of thing was kept up. Motions to amend, to reconsider, to table and so on were made so rapidly that the bewildered chairman lost all control of himself and the meeting until a few greenbackers came in; and among the number was Mr. Plumb, who were permitted to make a few suggestions on parliamentary rules, when the tangle was unraveled and the resolution shorn of its instructions to the delegates.
